THE MURDERER RETURNED.

George Thompson, the Negro Who Shot and Killed Martha Capps, in the County Jail.

Policeman Lon Bryan arrived on the shoofly from Smithfield yesterday morning having in custody George Thompson, the colored man charged with the murder of Martha Capps, at a minstrel show here in the spring of 1901. It was stated in Wednesday's Journal that the Marshal had received word that Thompson was in jail there awaiting orders from this city. Accordingly Mr. Bryan was sent to bring the accused back.

Thompson was arrested in Smithfield on the charge of carrying concealed weapons. Two revolvers, one of 38 calibre and the other of 32 calibre, two razors and half pint of whiskey were taken from him. He was identified by a negro there who was under the impression that a large reward was offered for him. It was on account of the statement made by the man that the authorities here were notified.

It will be remembered that Thompson was one of ten prisoners who escaped from the county jail Sunday Aug. 11th 1901. He and Lonzo Sparrow were in jail under the same charge that of murder. The crime was committed in the preceding spring at a minstrel show which was held under a tent at the fair grounds. He shot into a crowd of colored people intending to hit a man but the bullet went wild and hit the Capps woman mother of the intended victim. The woman died a short time after receiving the wound.

Thompson having made good his escape has been quite a traveler, he told officer Bryan. He said that he had been in New York a long while and had been working in Florence, S. C. He had been working on a farm near Smithfield for three months. He told officer Bryan that he intended coming to New Bern. He admits that he is the man wanted for the crime. He was dressed well and had three good suits of clothes in his traveling case. He had the general appearance of having had all the money he wanted.

A large number of morbid negroes gathered around him as he got off the train and he recognized quite a good many.

The man Sparrow who was with him when he shot the woman and also with him in the jail delivery, has never been located. Nearly all the other prisoners were caught after a short time.

N. C. Memorial at Appomattox.

Raleigh, March 23.—The committee in charge of the memorial to North Carolina troops at Appomattox met today and arranged the program, the date of the celebration is changed from April 9th, to 10th. The program is: Memorial prayer, by Rev. James A. Weston (Maj. 23rd North Carolina Regiment and in command of the regiment when it was paroled at Appomattox.) Remarks by Henry A. London, chairman memorial committee. Address by Governor Montague of Virginia. Address by Governor Glenn, this being the principal one. Ode, "Last of Appomattox" by Henry Jerome Stockard, of Raleigh. Short addresses by Brigadier General William R. Cox and William F. Roberts who commanded brigades at Appomattox.

Thomas S. Garnett Maj. Gen. commanding United Confederate Veterans of Virginia will be present in command of that body and take an active part in the exercises. Music will be furnished by the band of the third regiment North Carolina Guard and fifteen companies of the guard will be present.
