Charcoal is of no value as a fer tilizer—that is, it contains no actual plant, food. It has, however, other values which in some cases make it worth using. For instance, charcoal sandy solis a fair dressing of char-coal will darken the color of the soil, thus warming it up and making it easier to work and quicker and earlier in the spring. This, of course, refers to charcoal and not in any degree to soil in large quantities. Hogs and chickens are very fond of charcoal. It is well to keep some of it before then all the time.—Rural New Yorker,

Saving Chilled Lambs,

It is a good plan to keep a supply of eason. As soon as the chilled lamb is brought in have a large pail ready, into which pour warm water and temper it to blood heat. Put the lamb into the water and be careful to hold the head out. As soon as the temperature raise the lamb out of the water and add hot water until it is at blood heat again. Water For Dairy Cows. Plenty of good pure water is of prime mportance to profitable dairying, says H. G. Manchester in Rural New Yorker. A cow requires about four pounds ecturer. He has written several text of water for every pound of dry matter consumed, and this means that she needs 80 to 100 pounds daily. Of course silage and roots or other watery foods supply some of this, but most cows even when fed allage will use sixty to ninety nounds daily. Our experience has been that when this water supply is cut off in any manner there is al ways a shortage of milk. I personally

The manure from a well fed dairy and its proper management requires judgment. The better the feeding the better the manure. While all manure is worth good care, the better the manure the more important it is to handle it well to prevent heavy losses. The best single piece of advice as to handling stable manure is to get it from the stable to the land where wanted without delay and there spread it with the ionat possible expenditure of labor. Yet this general plan must be modified at times and according to circumstances.—Bulletin United States Department of Agriculture.

Feeding Work Horses.

Generally speaking, twelve to fifteen pounds each of hay and grain daily are sufficient for horses of 1,200 to 1,300 pounds weight doing moderately hard work. Oats may be considered par excellence the most satisfactory concentrate for horses and are largely fed in the north. Their relatively high cost is the only objection to their use. The New Hampshire station states that a mixing of brain and corn, half and half of weight, is a satisfactory substitute for outs for working boxes.—Bulletin Massachusetts Agriculturat College.
