As we said before we don't expect to accomplish anything but when a mail once is continually perpetuated there is nothing to do but protest.

BROKE AN EXPENSIVE WINDOW

An Inexplicable Act Committed By Some Evil Disposing Power.

A miserable piece of vandalism was perpetrated at the new Methodist Church Tuesday night. Some one broke the large stained glass window which has recently been set in, using either a stick or a stone to do it with. The obvious purpose was to get a place to raise the window as an offering could be obtained.

The damage is said not to be so bad that it cannot be remedied but it is the principal of the deed. The person who would be so low would not hesitate at greater vandalism. The great \$1200 window which will soon be put in would mean no more to him if he wished to get in the church than did the window he broke.

THE COMING COURT.

The Next Term of Superior Court For Trial of Criminal Cases to be One of Unusual Interest.

The spring term of the criminal court which commences Monday, April 10th, will be one of unusual interest. Probably no court has ever been held in Craven county when so many cases for murder and attempted murder were to be tried. Perhaps the one which will arouse the most interest will be that of T. W. Dewey, for embezzlement.

There are numerous cases of a petty nature to be tried and if all are disposed of within the six days allotted for this term the court will be work overtime every day.

The judge presiding at this term will be Hon. James L. Webb.

Here are the most important cases on the docket:

State vs T. W. Dewey, embezzlement

State vs John Peterson, wife murder.

State vs George Thompson, murder of Martha Capps.

State vs John Gilley, assault with intent to kill.

State vs George Carraway, murder.

The last mentioned case is for a killing in self defense the circumstances of which are well known here.

Cost Russia \$1,750,000.

Gumhu Pass, March 28—The Japanese are again moving forward and the Russian rear guard has fallen back from its position about 13 miles north of Sipinghai (74 miles north of Tie Pass), to Chaomindai, which is situated 40 miles below Gumhu Pass.

Practically complete reports show that the Russian army sacrificed general commissariat stores to the amount \$1,250,000 and stores for an army corps amounting to \$500,000 held at Mukden most of it being set on fire. The boots and uniforms among the stores of which the whole army was in need arrived from Europe four days before the Russian retreat from Mukden. General Kuropatkin ordered the removal of the stores but his order was not executed. An investigation will be made to establish the responsibility.

The manager of a large dressmaking establishment in New York says: "I suppose that the most un-American immigrants we get in this country are not the Chinese or the Poles or the Hungarians, but the Persian women. These women come here to save the price of a 'hot' out of our high American wages. It takes from two to five years to do that. In all that time they never mix with Americans, never visit a theater, never make the first attempt to learn the language. Some of them go to the French church on Sundays; otherwise they never leave their homes except to sleep. This persistent period in New York is just a slow drip out of their lives. They talk of nothing day after day but what they'll do when they get back to Paris and begin to live again."
