## THE TEACHERS' ASSEMBLY MEETING

Great Interest in The Meeting to Be Held in Greensboro, June 13-15

Dr. W. W. Stetson, State Superintendent of Maine to Be Present.

Interest continues to increase in the great meeting of the North Carolina Teachers' Assembly which will be held in Greensboro, June 13-15. The Executive Committee is making extensive preparation for the occasion.

The program that is being prepared guarantees a most significant meeting, that will certainly mean a vast deal to the educational progress of the State. Several men and women from outside the State, who are known throughout the entire nation, will be present to take part in the work. Prominent among these will be Dr. W. W. Stetson, State Superintendent of Maine, who will be present during the entire meeting. Dr. Stetson will work with the Department of County Superintendents in all of their sessions and will address the entire Assembly once or twice. He is a wise man, has a most attractive personality, and is an able speaker. He has done great things in his work in his own state. In his letter to President Foost, accepting the invitation to come to the meeting of the Assembly, he says: "I will come when you want me, and speak upon the subjects that you name, if I can." The Committee is very fortunate in securing such a man. They have been equally fortunate in securing other speakers whose names will be announced within a few days.

It is expected that over 3000 teachers will be in attendance at this meeting. The city of Greensboro will extend a cordial welcome to all and the desire is to have every teacher in the State attend.

### Found Not Guilty.

The Kinston Free Press 31st says: The jury in the George Hawkins case returned a verdict of not guilty in the convening of court for the morning session today. They were given the case last night about 10 o'clock, and though having the case all night it was said they were practically agreed on their verdict soon after they got the case, with the exception of two or three jurors who wanted some few points discussed more fully than they could in the tired condition they naturally were late last night. Hence the final verdict was not reached until this morning. The killing for which Hawkins was tried was purely self defense and a deed for which he was justified by neighbors and friends.

### Ready for Service.

Kinston Free Press 31st. "The Dover and Southbound will put on a passenger car within less than a week," said Mr. Charles A. Rhodes of Comfort, this afternoon in The Free Press office. "At least that is the information given me this morning as I came up on the Goldsboro Lumber Co's train." "That road makes regular runs from Dover to Richlands, with good connection for A. & N. C. trains.

"It is the biggest thing that ever happened for that country down there in Jones and Onslow," continued Mr. Rhodes. "The road hauls logs for the most part, but a lot of freight is taken along, too. Why only a day or so ago ten solid carloads of fertilizer went down the road. The company allows people to ride now, as a matter of accommodation, but when the passenger coach is put on, a regular service will be established."

The Free press man agreed with Mr. Rhodes that the Goldsboro Lumber Co., besides serving its own ends in procuring lumber is doing a big thing for the people of an undeveloped section in providing them with rail facilities.

## THE STATE FARMERS' CONVENTION.

A Great Gathering of the Tillers of the Soil at Raleigh in August.

A State Farmers' Convention will be held in Raleigh in August. It will be a big affair and there will be nothing left off from the program that is of real interest and worth to the farmer. Arrangements have been made to accommodate 1,500 guests. Should there be any probability of a larger attendance enough reserve accommodations have been provided to make everybody comfortable.

Some of the special features of the coming convention will be the woman's section, to which will be invited all the women of the State. A special program of interest to women will be arranged, and practical subjects important to every woman in the State discussed. It is believed this branch of the convention will be exceedingly popular and valuable.

The mornings of each day will be entirely devoted to the special meetings. In one room will be discussed questions pertaining to poultry raising; in another room a section in dairying will meet at the same time; and a third section will be given to cotton and tobacco culture. This arrangement of the program will enable each attendant to attend the meeting where his special interest lies. The afternoon sessions will be devoted especially to questions of general interest, such as soil improvement; labor, organization, diversification and general crops. In this manner, every member of the convention will at all times be interested in the subjects considered. The evening programs will be given to general subjects of a practical application to agriculture.

Vice-presidents have been or will be appointed from every county in the State. Mr. William Dunn is the vice-president for Craven county.
