## NOT AFTER VAGRANTS.

New Vagrancy Law Being Strictly Enforced at Raleigh.

Raleigh, April 1.—On Monday a young white man, James Eagles, is to be tried here under the new vagrancy law, the allegation being that he is now and has always been a gambler, a hanger on of pool rooms etc., and has never done any work. A warrant was served on him and he is at large on his recognizance. Another warrant was served Wednesday on Roger A. Nott, who has been for many years a gambler here and at other points, but it is understood from the police that Nott left here last night only a few hours after the warrant was served and that he has left the state and gone to Richmond, his old home. It appears to be the belief that he will not return. A third warrant is in the hands of the officers, this one being for John Hayes on the same charge. The police say Hayes cannot be found and that he has probably departed also and may have left the state.

Mr. John B. Taylor, whose severe illness was noted in the Journal of yesterday, died at his home in Goldsboro Friday night. He was well known here having been a resident of New Bern for several years. He was a prominent citizen of Goldsboro and a member of several orders. He conducted a cafe and was a successful business man. His funeral and interment occurred in Goldsboro yesterday.
