Rome, April 2.—The Simplon tunnel, the longest in the world, was inaugurated this morning, when, from the Swiss and Italian sides, the first trains passed through, meeting at the center, where there was an iron door which originally prevented the overflow of a torrent of hot water, and which today was opened for the first time. The weather at the entrance to the tunnel was spring-like, though the surrounding mountains were covered with snow; but, once inside, the temperature became very high.

THAT INSCRIPTION IRRITATES.

Confederate Veterans Want Appomattox Motto Changed. Raleigh Gets After Sports Through Vagrancy Law.

Raleigh, N. C., April 3.—State Auditor Dixon, as was first stated in this correspondence took ground against the inscription on the memorial to be dedicated next Monday, at Appomattox. Letters are coming in to him from confederate veterans endorsing his views. A letter today from General William R. Cox, whose brigade fired the last volley there, says: "I fully endorse your views as to inscription on the monument at Appomattox. I have written to chairman Henry A. London of the monument committee, that I do not propose to be present at the unveiling." Another letter is from James T. Morehead of Greensboro, and says: "Is it too late to change the legend of Appomattox monument, to one simply, saying, that it marks the spot where the last gun was fired, and that it was fired by a North Carolina brigade?"

Jim Eagles a young sporting man who has been much in evidence here for some time, was before the mayor here today under the new law, charged with being a professional gambler and living in idleness. He entered a plea of not guilty and also one of nolo contendere. Upon this mayor Powell fined him \$25 and costs, which he immediately paid. Two other men, Nott and Hayes, who were wanted by the police have left Raleigh.

Lumber Moving Fast.

There has been a more than usually lively movement of lumber and it is almost a daily sight to see tugs with two three or more barges and schooners in tow. In all the amount shipped within the past ten days from local mills and mills in this vicinity is estimated to be between 2,500,000 and 3,000,000 feet.

The barges now being loaded here are Comet, Atlas, Orion at Mungler and Bennetts; Joseph; P. Tucker at the Blades mill at James City; Agnes McNally at Elm City Company's dock. The barge Frank is at Union Point.

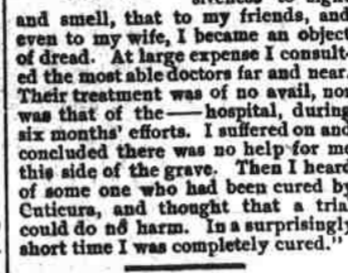
