THE ACCEPTED TRADE AND INDUSTRIAL MORALS.

Perhaps one of the best and strongest evidences of the world's moral improvement, is to be found in the condemnation, which is becoming more frequent, that is placed upon questionable trade or business methods of getting money, if not riches.

The weight and power of money is very terrible in its strength, and ability to accomplish things, but it cannot be fully substantiated in this day that money can control every thing, can purchase men and women as though they were chattels, and absolutely crush any power that might be aimed against its demands in wrong doing.

This does not mean that men and women cannot be bought, or that souls will not be exchanged for wealth, but each year there is an increasing force for good, for morality, and character, which places manhood and womanhood further beyond the comparison of their possible exchange for gold or its equivalent.

The recent protest against receiving the John D. Rockefeller gift by the Congregationalists of New England shows that there is public sentiment which can be shocked, and will declare against the violation of the moral code in trade, although Mr. Rockefeller may have dealt and secured his hundreds of millions of dollars by accepted trade ethics which has saved him from the punishment under the moral statute.

Because churches and colleges and schools have been built and maintained upon money received which was made by questionable if not notorious methods, it does lessen the fact of the taint and diabolism connected with the obtaining of the money. The knight of the road a few centuries ago relieved the rich of their purses, and eased the guilt of the act by a profuse generosity to the poor or some priest. The Rockefeller of today takes the advantage of the consumer, and with the tribute exacted builds colleges, hospitals and gives to missions, as an equivalent or atonement for his act.

Neither man has been condemned, in his time and day, except by a minority of his fellows, for beneath it all there has been the question if any of the accepted business methods had been violated, or sufficiently proven against the presumed offenders, except upon moral grounds, so that they might not pursue their ways, and take and give as had been their custom during their lives.

But it is a matter of congratulation that there is a disapproval growing which will make less acceptable each year, the hitherto accepted business ethics, which gave so account as to morals, but built up fortunes through force, without the consideration of right or wrong.

The April-June Forum.

A DISCUSSION OF "AMERICAN POLITICS" by Henry Litchfield West opens the April-June issue of THE FORUM. It is naturally concerned in the main with the policy and administration of President Roosevelt. A companion article on "Foreign Affairs" by A. Macario Low touches upon several European problems, but lays special stress upon the internal and external fortunes of Russia. A. D. Noyes analyzes the most notable episodes of the last three months in "Finance," and is followed by a review of recent progress in "Applied Science," contributed by Henry Harrison Suplee. H. W. Horwill's paper on "Literature" reviews the most important recent biographies. Present tendencies in "Music" are critically considered by Joseph Sahn. "The Educational Outlook" is discussed by Cassian H. Lang. In addition to the articles already named, which are mainly of the nature of reviews of the past quarter, the present issue contains three papers on special subjects: "America's Economic Future in the Far East," by Baron Kaneko, formerly Minister of Agriculture and Commerce in the Japanese Cabinet; "The Government of the Great City," by W. Rodman Peabody; and "A New Edition of Defoe," by Prof. W. P. Trent.
