GEN. CULLEN A. BATTLE

The Former Well Known and Esteemed
New Bernian Dies at Greensboro.

The following special from Greens-
boro tells of the death of the gentleman
who lived in New Bern many years,
and was devoted to this city and its
people. General Battle was on the
Journal's editorial staff for several
years, and wrote many articles besides
for this paper. At one time he was
Mayor of New Bern, and was always
prominent in affairs here, especially in
matters of politics and those concerning
the welfare and interest of Confederate
Veterans.

It will be with general sorrow that
the news of his death is learned in this
city:
Greensboro, April 8.—General C. A.
Battle died this morning at nine o'clock,
aged 75. He was sick for two weeks.
The remains will be taken to Petersburg
tomorrow for interment beside his
wife.
