Why Coughing Weakens You. A patient German scientist of a statistical turn of mind calculates that the amount of energy expended by a person who coughs once every quarter of an hour for ten hours is equivalent to 250 units of heat, or the nourishment yielded by three eggs or two glasses of milk. Coughing is thus seen to be an expensive luxury. The reason for the waste in force entailed by it, or one reason at least, lies in the fact that, while in normal respiration the air is expelled from the chest at the rate of four feet a second, in the least coughing it may attain a velocity of 800 feet.
