SOUTHPORT'S INTERESTS

Governor Pledges All Assistance to Coaling Station Project.

No Decision on State Printing. Big Seizure of Whiskey. Big State Charter. Raleigh's Success in Liquor Selling.

Raleigh, April 19.—Governor Glenn has received, in reply to a letter written him to F. H. Fries at Winston-Salem urging that Southport be given the coaling station of the Winston-Salem southbound railroad instead of Charleston, an assurance that the advantages of Southport shall be considered. The Governor has pledged to the enterprise every assistance in his power and the aid of the penitentiary convicts in construction if the interests of Southport are only cared for and the coaling station located there.

President Vann of the Baptist University for women announces that Mrs. Henry Appy, now of the University of Colorado has been elected instructor of vocal music to succeed Miss Hopkins, resigned. Mrs. Appy to take charge of the classes next September. The directors of Raleigh Cotton Mill, here, have declared a three per cent semi-annual dividend. There was a long conference of the State printing commission in the office of Governor Glenn last evening but no decision was reached as to the awarding of the contract. Both the bidders, E. M. Uzzell and Edwards & Broughton, were called before the board and given a hearing in explanation of their respective bids. There will be another session some time today when the award will probably be made.

The Carolina Plumbing and Heating Co., of Charlotte has been awarded the contract to put in the plumbing, gas and heating appliances in the new agricultural building at the A. & M. College, their bid having been \$6,825.

Judge Purnell and other court officers have returned from Elizabeth City, where a term of the United States District and Circuit court was convened Monday, there being only one case ready for trial, it was disposed of and the court adjourned the same day.

Sixty-seven barrels of whiskey that was seized for irregularities from W. Y. Carvor at Roxboro was released yesterday, being duly stamped. The entire lot was sold to the Roxboro dispensary.

Information from trucking sections hereabouts is to the effect that much damage was done especially to strawberries and tomatoes.

The earnings of the Raleigh dispensary for the past quarter amounts to \$12,500, a gain of \$4,500 over the same period last year. The increase is in part due to the fact that the legislature was in session two months of the quarter this year.

The dispensary has two days in each week to buy empty bottles and buys on an average \$150 worth of these old bottles each week. They are gathered up about the city principally by negroes and resold to the dispensary.

Application was made this morning to the Secretary of State for a chartering of a new mill and a half dollar corporation at Gullowhee, N. C., but the papers had to go back for correction in that they had failed to comply with the law in specifying interest and some other particulars concerning the issuance of preferred stock.
