## RUSSIANS MUST MOVE.

FURTHER DELAY OF ROJESTVENSKY'S FLEET ENDANGERS PEACE.

French Gain Japanese on Neutrality Matter. Japanese Will Use Torpedo Destroyers in Attacking Russian Warships.

St. Petersburg, April 21.—The admiral has warned Rojostvensky that further stay in Kamranh bay endangers peace. It tells him to leave at once for fear that England may espouse the cause of Japan.

Paris, April 21.—The Japanese minister this evening formally requested foreign minister Delcasse to call the attention of Russia to the presence of the Russian fleet in Kamranh bay. The French government sent special instructions to Indo China. It is stated the authorities there had already acted toward Admiral Rojostvensky, as they did toward Japan recently when the latter's cruiser visited Kamranh bay, requesting them to leave at the end of the time limit. Foreign office officials say Delcasse was able to calm the Japanese minister's anxiety which, however was not justified by any acts on the part of the French authorities.

London, April 21.—The informal protest of Dr. Montono, the Japanese Minister in Paris, to the French Government against the continued stay of the Russian fleet in Kamranh bay, will, it is thought, tend to hasten the meeting of the two fleets.

If the report from Tokio is true that Admiral Togo has been ordered to sail at once and give battle to Rojostvensky before he has been reinforced by Nebog staff's fleet, which has been reported in the vicinity of the Sunda straits the long looked for battle should take place within the next day or two. It is the opinion of British naval experts that Rojostvensky does not consider himself strong enough at present to justify him in moving nearer to Formosa without the reinforcements that are now being hurried to him.

The Japanese fleet is believed to have a much larger and more efficient force of torpedo boats and destroyers than the Russians and their work with this sort of craft during the siege of Port Arthur justifies the belief that they will open the coming battle with a torpedo attack which will probably be delivered under cover of darkness. This it is believed, is dreaded by the Russian admiral more than the test of superiority between his battleships and cruisers and those of the enemy.

### Death of Mr. W. F. Rountree.

The announcement of the death of Mr. W. F. Rountree yesterday morning was a great surprise and shock to his many friends. Although it was known that he was in feeble health, his appearance on the street, and his active nature concealed from his acquaintances the evidences of any material decline in health. He failed to appear at his home at the supper hour, but as this was a frequent occurrence nothing was thought of it. His family became alarmed when he failed to be at home at the usual hour and his son Mitchell went out in search for him. The latter in company with Edwin Richardson found Mr. Rountree lying on the couch in his office in a semi-conscious condition. He was removed to his home and tenderly cared for but efforts to restore him were unavailing and he passed away at nine o'clock Friday morning. The disease was apoplexy.

William F. Rountree was born near Grifton 43 years ago. He rendered valuable services throughout the war, being a member of Company A, 27th regiment North Carolina Infantry. He was married to Miss Julia Mitchell, daughter of the late Alexander Mitchell, who with three children Messrs. William Rountree, of New York, Mitchell and Miss Mattie Rountree of New Bern, survive.

Mr. Rountree was an honored and a useful citizen. He was formerly fence a trustee of the asylum at Goldsboro. He was also high in the regard of many fraternal orders and was a wife and wise adviser at all times. His association with several interests in the State have given him a wide acquaintance and in those offices as well as others with which he was familiar he will be sadly missed.

## NAMES MAY 18TH

As Date For New Bern Unveiling Federal Monument. Dunn Wants Prohibition.

Raleigh, April 21.—The New Jersey committee in charge of the preparation for the unveiling of the monument to the Ninth New Jersey Volunteers at New Bern have written to Governor Glenn asking him to name the date for the unveiling ceremonies and he names Thursday May 18th. Gov. Glenn, his staff and as many of the companies of the North Carolina National Guard as possible will attend. The Governor of New Jersey and others of the state of officials are also to be present. There will be elaborate receptions, one on one evening by the citizens of New Bern, and the other on the next evening by veterans of the Ninth New Jersey volunteers.

## ALMOST ELECTED

After a Hot Contest Isaac Powell Falls Short

Only Three Votes of Being Elected  
Commander of G. A. R.

Isaac Powell, a well known colored man of New Bern was a candidate for the election of Commander of the Virginia-Carolina G. A. R. which held its annual meeting at Newport News Thursday. He came very near being elected, falling of election by only three votes. His opponent was a white man. The special from Newport News which appeared in the morning papers, was as follows:

"Department of Virginia and North Carolina, Grand Army of the Republic held its annual encampment in the theater of the National Soldiers' Home at Hampton today. About 100 delegates were in attendance. Capt. John C. Fowler of Richmond, department commander, presided over the sessions of the encampment. Just before adjournment this evening the following officers for the ensuing year were elected: Commander, Charles H. Osborne; Phoe bus, Va.; senior vice-commander, Isaac Powell, colored, New Bern, N. C. "There was a hot fight between Osborne and Powell, for office of commander, the negro losing by only three votes.

## ALL BECAUSE OF THE BEEF TRUST

Immense Losses Inflicted on the West by the

Vast Packing Combination.

Mr. Charles E. Russell, writing of the "Greatest Trust in the World" in the May number of "Everybody's" shows what the Beef Trust has cost the farmer, the local banker, and the feeder. He says:

"From July 1903 to July 1904, the average loss on every head of cattle fat tenned and sold in the Middle West was \$8. Of course, there could be but one result: the farmer, the real supporter of a large part of the Middle West, became strained in his money affairs to the general ill-fortune of his neighborhood, and in many regions the farm mortgage, that blighting emblem of wrong conditions, returned to an evil eminence from which it had once been banished.

"The total losses of the cattle-feeders in Iowa in 1904 are computed at \$12,500,000. In 1903 and 1904 forty banks in Iowa failed, closed their doors, or went out of business, and at least seven bank officers committed suicide. Even in time of National business depression and panic there has been no such record as this.

"Mr. Doane Robinson, secretary of the Historical Society, has estimated the losses, in 1904, to South Dakota cattlemen at \$10,000,000.

"In Iowa, \$12,500,000, in South Dakota \$10,000,000; and wherever in the Middle West cattle were sent to market an average loss of eight dollars a head."
