BISHOP WATSON BURIED.

Impressive Services Over the Remains of the Venerable and Beloved Prelate.

The obsequies of the late Right Reverent Bishop A. A. Watson were conducted in the Parish Church of St. James in Wilmington Tuesday in the presence of a large and distinguished congregation. The services were simple but impressive and were in accord with the sincere, consecrated life of the bishop.

The exercises were directed by Bishop Strange who succeeds to the bishopric of the deceased.

The funeral hymns were rendered by a full chorale choir, the music being one of the prettiest features of the solemn ceremonies.

The services were by Bishop Ellison Capers, of South Carolina, and Bishop Joseph Blount Chesire, of North Carolina. The funeral escort was composed of the Revs. R. B. Drane, of Edenton; T. M. N. George, of New Bern; F. H. T. Horsfield, of Goldsboro; L. L. Williams, of Elizabeth City; John H. Griffith, Jr., of Kinston, and Isaac W. Hughes, of Fayetteville.

Federal Court Adjourns.

Contrary to expectations the business in the United States Court was finished for the term yesterday, all jurors being discharged and the officers returning to Raleigh. Many of the cases were continued which were presumed to be brought for trial but for want of necessary evidence and other reasons they were continued until the next term of court.

Following are the cases heard and other items of business transacted: United States vs Hafford Willis; retaining liquor, continued as upon affidavit. Bond renewed.

United States vs E. S. Simmons; demanding, receiving and retaining pension claims. To pay \$100 and renew bond within 20 days for appearance at next term of court.

United States vs W. R. Harper; ruled for contempt for non payment of costs. Rule continued.

United States vs Washington Brown; Judgment prayed. Defendant to pay double the amount of tax on 40 gallons of whiskey, amounting to \$80, to pay a fine of \$200 and be imprisoned for three months.

In bankruptcy, the case of Assad and N. Ellis was argued by counsel R. A. Nunn, H. C. Whitehurst and W. W. Clark. Petition and rule dismissed at cost of petitioners.

On motion of W. W. Clark, Ernest M. Green was sworn and admitted to practice as attorney in United States courts.

In the matter of William Cosby vs Tug Sue, the marshal was ordered to file an affidavit as to compensation of care taker. Affidavit filed. Costs as taxed by the clerk allowed.

Court adjourned at 2 o'clock p. m.

IT IS A CONTEST

EVEN AUSTRALIAN BALLOT NO ELECTION BARRIER.

Stronach Enters Protest at Raleigh. Unveiling at Bethel. A Milk Commission Criminal Gets New Trial.

Raleigh, N. C. April 27.—It is understood that good progress is being made in the preparation for the unveiling of the monuments on the Battlefield of Bethel by North Carolina and Virginia on June 10th Governor Glenn and Governor Montague will be the principal speakers and all the other governors of the Southern states have been invited to attend.

As a result of the second primary held yesterday, Jas. I. Johnson is the nominee for mayor, receiving 990 against 499 for Frank Stronach. Thos Badger is police justice receiving 915 against 546 for Beckwith, Jno. S. Jones 888 against 646 for Lumsden.

Frank Stronach has made the statement that he will contest the nomination of Johnson on the ground that the entire vote in one of the wards—the first division of the third—is illegal in that the judges in connection with the operation of the new Australian ballot system they held that in cases where the voter could not read friends would be allowed to prepare the tickets for them in the presence of the poll holder. It is not believed that such a step will be taken by Mr. Stronach ultimately.

An agreement has been reached by the committee delegated by the board of Aldermen to regulate the milk supply in Raleigh that there shall be a milk commission established by whom there shall be inspections made at least once a month of every dairy selling milk in Raleigh and the cows shall be inspected for tuberculosis and bacteria. It is estimated that the system will cost the city about \$500.

As a result of the ruling just made by the Supreme Court Robert Hayes in Robeson county is to have another chance for his life by a new trial for criminal assault on Mary Inman. The new trial being on the ground that the court below erred in stopping a cross examination of the prosecu x regarding a letter she had written the prisoner the day after the alleged assault.

A SUBSTANTIAL INDUSTRY.

The Blades Hosiery Mill Conducted With Business Like Methods Gets Good Results.

There is among New Bern's industrial factors an industrial institution which is an exemplification of the old maxim to "say nothing but saw wood" but never the less it is one of the busiest places in the city. The Blades Hosiery Mill does not blow a very loud horn in the public ear for itself but it has created and is sustaining a splendid reputation in commercial circles.

Mr. William B. Blades came in possession of the New Bern Knitting Mill in November 1903. The plant was then in a condition from a mechanical standpoint that operatives worked at a great disadvantage; the machines being slow and not furnished with the accurate and automatic mechanism which gives the work perfection all of which was a handicap to the securing of large business. The plant has since the occupation by Mr. Blades, been thoroughly overhauled and supplied with new and modern machinery, the best that the market affords. New devices and machines are being received constantly. There are in the plant three sets of machines which are used for the manufacture of the goods. They consist of 40 sets of ribbers, 28 automatic knitters, 18 standard knitters and 12 loopers.

The goods manufactured at this plant are misses' and boys hosiery exclusively. The capacity is 250 dozen a day and the demand is large and increasing all the time. They have orders from all over the country and are encouraged by the reports of sales.

The employees at the plant number sixty persons; fifty of whom are women. The mill like all other industrial concerns of New Bern confirm the appearance of prosperity and increased business facilities. Substantial institutions, such as the Blades Hosiery Mill will find room and a hearty welcome in our city.
