### FORMAL ELECTION AFFAIR.

Series of Farmers Institutes. Evidence in Damage Suit. Probable Reduction of Colored State Normals.

Raleigh, May 1.—Two series of farmers institutes have been arranged by the State Department of Agriculture for the month of July 18, to August 12, one under the direction of State Veterinarian Tate Butler and the other under State Horticulturalist H. H. Hume. Several members of the faculty of the A. & M. College and two specialists from Washington will participate. The institutes under Dr. Butler will be in Granville 18, Vance 19, Franklin 20, Orange 21, Pearson 22, Caswell 24, Rockingham 26, Stokes 27, Davidson 28, Rowan 29, Stanly 31, Iredell August 1, Catawba 2, Lincoln 3, Caswell 4, Anson 5, Richmond 7, Scotland 8, Robeson 9, Cumberland 10, Johnson 11, Harnett 12. Institutes under Dr. Hume will be: Chatham July 18, Moore 19, Montgomery 20, Randolph 21, Guilford 22, Cabarrus 24, Mecklenburg 25, and 26; Union 25, and 26; Cleveland 27, Rutherford 28, McDowell 29, Burke 30; Caldwell August 1, Alexander 2, Wilkes 3, Surry 5, Yadkin 7, Davie 8, Forsythe 9, Alamance 10, Durham 11.

The taking of evidence in the damage suit of Pegram vs Seaboard Air Line for \$35,000 damages for the burning of John M. Wilson to death in the Hamlet Compress fire in 1902 was concluded today and the argument by counsel and the charge to the jury will take place tomorrow. An effort was made to show that the fire was from a spark from a wood-burning engine and the railroad company was therefore liable. On the other hand the railroad company sought to show that such was not the source of the fire and that even if it had been Wilson's act in rushing back into the compress after the fire was started as reckless and rash to a degree that relieved the company from liability.

The city election held today was the most quiet ever known in Raleigh, it being the merest formality for the confirmation of the nominations made in the recent legalized democratic primary. James I. Johnson is Mayor. W. W. Wilson City Clerk, Thos Badger police justice and John S. Jones City Tax Collector. There was no ticket in opposition to any of the democratic nominees.

It seems settled now that the State Board of Education will soon make an order reducing the number of colored State Normals from four to two. Last year they were reduced from six to four. The schools now in operation are at Winston, Franklinton, Elizabeth City and Fayetteville. The board is convinced that concentration with more improved plants and apparatus is the solution of the problem.

### TROUBLE FEARED IN POLAND.

Quiet Easter Sunday in Russia. Police and Cossacks on Duty.

St. Petersburg, May 1.—Easter Sunday, which is the occasion in Russia of a general interchange of visits, both of social and personal, and of generous hospitality, passed off with entire quiet in St. Petersburg, and no disturbances in the provinces have been noted. In the factory quarters of St. Petersburg police and Cossacks were much in evidence manifesting their presence by constant patrolling, but there was no occasion for their services, and it is thought the situation is well in hand for today, when disorders have been apprehended. The situation has none of the ominousness of the eve of January 22.

In Poland, however, serious trouble today is feared. There was rioting on a small scale on Saturday in one or two places. From Kishinev, where attempts to stir up the Jew-baiting sentiment have caused the clergy to exhort their congregations to preserve order, no demonstrations have been reported.
