### ATLANTIC HOTEL TO OPEN.

Charlotte Men to Run The Famous Hostelry. Sleeping Cars For Summer Months To Morehead.

Morehead City, N. C., May 4.—The Atlantic Hotel at this place, owned by the Atlantic & North Carolina Railroad has been leased for the coming season to C. Gresham & Son, Charlotte, N. C. and will be under the management of Mr. Willis P. Collins, who has successfully managed resort hotels in Western North Carolina and some of the Western States. The Greshams are well known all over North Carolina and the South as managers of famous eating houses at important points on the Southern, Atlantic Coast Line and Seaboard Air Line railways. In preparation for the summer business a large amount of money has been expended in partially refurnishing many of the rooms of the hotel and refitting the dining room and kitchen. It is therefore a safe prediction that the hotel will this summer be kept in splendid style and its table will be unsurpassed. The hotel will be opened in part on May 15th, receiving such guests as may care to come here at that time, and will be formally opened on June 1st, as usual. Already a large number of guests have been booked for the summer, there being a greater number of applications than has ever before been known so early. In order to accommodate the large number of visitors to this popular seaside resort the Atlantic & North Carolina Railroad has announced that in addition to its usual train service, it will run special trains every Sunday. These special trains will not only afford cheap rates to this point, but will make it possible for excursion visitors to spend a longer time at the seashore than heretofore.

Perhaps the greatest improvement, however, and one that has long been wished for by the people along the line and the traveling public generally is the announcement that through sleeping cars will be regularly operated during the summer in connection with the Southern Railway to and from Morehead.

### NO VERDICT PATTERSON CASE.

Mistrial and Jury Discharged. Jury Cannot Agree. Third Attempt a Failure to Settle the Case.

New York, May 4.—At 1:30 o'clock this morning the jury in the case of Nan Patterson, tried for the third time on the charge of murdering Caesar Young, was called in to the court room by Recorder Goff. When the 12 men were in their places and the court officials had all arrived, the recorder asked why the defendant had not been brought into court. A deputy sheriff replied that she had been feeling ill and had retired, but was then being dressed. After a wait of 12 minutes, Miss Patterson appeared looking pale and in a highly nervous state.

"Gentlemen, have you been able to reach an agreement?" asked the recorder of the jury.

"No, sir," replied the foreman.

"Is there any question of law or evidence in which I can instruct you? Is there any way in which the court can help you?"

The foreman looked for an instant at his fellowmen, then turning to the recorder, said: "No, sir, I don't believe you can help us."

"Then you will retire to reconsider the matter."

The jury filed out and the court room was cleared. Recorder Goff remained in his chamber ready to receive a verdict if rendered or to further instruct the jury. Upon being assured that there was no chance of an agreement, he discharged the jury.

### IN FINANCIAL DIFFICULTIES.

C. R. Tyson Involved in Debt and Creditors Make Demands.

Mr. C. R. Tyson, a young man who recently came to this city from Nashville, N. C., and bought Mr. L. J. Tyson's stock a few months ago is in financial difficulties in the city apparently anxious to avoid sundry bills which the wholesale grocers have against him.

Tuesday night he closed an agreement to sell his stock to J. O. Land and J. H. Weddell, the latter having only a nominal interest. After the bargain was made the purchaser began to take an inventory.

Wednesday morning it became known of this transaction several wholesale grocers who had accounts against him and began to investigate where they were going to get their money.

It was found that Tyson had been conducting business in his wife's name in order to shirk responsibility. Her name is C. R. Tyson, and his business had been conducted under the name of E. M. Tyson the initials of his wife, and it was generally supposed that the name was genuine.

Under this name he has not only deceived local dealers but wholesale grocers out of the city. The amount of the indebtedness is said to be between \$1,200 and \$1,500. The claim of local dealers being \$700.

Mr. R. A. Nunn has bills of several of these creditors and has evidence that Tyson is guilty of fraud and it is probable that he will have to answer for criminal action as well as civil. Several suits in the civil courts have been filed against him. He is reported as having transacted business in other cities in the same manner.

### COLONIZATION AGENT WILL LEAVE.

The Italian Immigration Agent, Returns Today Highly Pleased With His Visit.

Ubaldo Pomarato, the Italian lawyer who has been in the city for several days endeavoring to get people interested in an Italian colonization scheme, leaves for his home in Providence, Rhode Island. He expresses himself as highly pleased with his visit and believes that it will meet with good results although nothing definite has been done yet.

He interviewed many persons including farmers around New Bern on his project and he went to Goldsboro and made some investigations there. He was kindly received and his plan was acknowledged by all to be one that would prove valuable should it be put into practice. He says many farmers are anxious to employ Italian laborers.

He wishes to thank Sen. Simmons and Mr. A. D. Ward for their valuable assistance and interest they took in the matter and also to express his obligations to others who have given him encouragement. He has been successful in leading several colonies here and all have given excellent satisfaction.
