SHORT PASSING EVENTS.

The steamer Neuse took out about one thousand baskets of peas and about the same number of crates of cabbage, Monday. The train had also as much truck as could be very well handled with the facilities. Two daily truck trains will be put on Tuesday to relieve the strain.

For a long time the people in the neighborhood of Five Points have been greatly annoyed by a pool of water which accumulates in Rountree street with each rain, and stagnates until the water evaporates or is absorbed by the earth. This pond takes up the entire width of the street and sometimes for several days after a rain cannot be passed without wading. Besides the inconvenience it is said that the pond has caused more or less sickness. Although drainage can be easily and cheaply accomplished, the prayers of the citizens who are affected, to that purpose has been in vain. It was learned that a law suit is meditated to compel the city to abate the nuisance.
