#### ATLANTIC COAST LINE SOAKED.

The Jury in Barker Case Returns Verdict  
Second Time for \$5,000.

The Jury brought in a verdict yesterday afternoon in favor of the plaintiff in the Barker vs the Atlantic Coast Line railway, awarding her a judgment of \$5,000.

This was the second time the jury had rendered a verdict; the Judge setting aside the verdict and remanding the case back to the court for a new trial. The case was fought hard and there is a probability that it will be continued either to a higher court or new trial demanded.

Police Court News.

David Bryan, Thomas Bonner, Columbus Bonner and Richard Fulcher were tried in the municipal court yesterday for disorderly conduct. Sam Taylor the complaining witness testified that the men entered his place formerly owned by Jack Rodman and acted in a boisterous manner. A whiskey bottle played some prominence in the evidence as the prisoners are said to have been drinking whiskey. Mayor Patterson questioned the defendants and learned that they had bought it as "tonic" and mixed it with cider. Bryan said he bought it of Taylor, but the latter denied it. Bryan was informed that he would have to divulge the place he got the whiskey or be fined \$30.

All four defendants were fined \$2.50 each and the costs.

Sam Hill was fined \$2.00 and costs for disorderly conduct. Two cases were continued until today in order to procure necessary witnesses.

Bessie Smith, a white woman from Wilmington was brought in after court adjourned and arraigned for disorderly conduct. She came here from Wilmington last Saturday having been sent out of that city by the Mayor.

#### Choosing a Saw Saw.

In choosing a saw hold it up clear of everything with one hand and ring the blade with the other, says American Cultivator. It will show where your knuckles hit it, according to the temper and quality of carbon in the blade. The longer it hits or vibrates the better the quality of the steel. Then look down the teeth from end to end and see that the blade is straight and look along on the flat of both sides to see that it is not "curved"—that is, hollow in some places and full in others. This is a great drawback to a saw, as it pulls hard through the full spots or bumps, knocking against the cut ends as it runs through the log. It is a fault very hard to detect in a new saw; in an old one very easy, as the bumps show bright and polished from knocking and the hollow dull from receiving the friction. See that the saw is not too thick or it wastes too much strength to saw with it.

#### The Work Shows in Spring.

When the beginning to work the horse after a contracted period of rest it is far better to use him carefully and not exhaust his condition. If a long and necessary drive has to be made, "take breath" occasionally. If he is sweating profusely rub the collar and other places where he is likely to be galled, and do not let there be a "sweat" place under the harness anywhere. When standing over with him, look him over and do not allow a horse to stand where there is a draft of wind. Handle carefully, clean thoroughly, feed judiciously and there will be but little chance for complaint or accident of any kind. It is necessary to condition your horse and give him a good rest.

Celebrated Gattis-Kilgo Continued  
For Special Call Term.

State Fair Buildings Struck By Lightning.  
Plato Collins' Fine Address. Election  
Officers Grand Lodge Masons.  
Commencement Shaw  
University.

Raleigh, May 12.—During a severe  
thunder storm that passed over the  
city last evening lightning struck the  
State fair buildings at the fair ground  
and displaced three thousand shingles.  
The heavy downpour of rain was all  
that saved the buildings from destruction  
by fire.

Grand Master Plato Collins of Kin-  
ston, of the North Carolina Grand  
Lodge of Odd Fellows delivered an ad-  
dress on Odd Fellowship here last night  
that was greatly enjoyed by the visit-  
ing and local lodges. He declares  
his intention of making the coming  
year the most significant for progress  
in the history of this order. The erec-  
tion of the \$6,000 building for the Odd  
Fellows Home for the aged and infirm  
is to be one of the specialties of the  
work for the year.

Governor Glenn makes an order for  
a special term of Wake county superior  
court to convene June 12th, for the  
special purpose of trying the noted  
damage suit of T. J. Gattis vs Dr. Jno.  
C. Kilgo and B. N. Duke as trustee of  
Trinity college. It is to be held by  
Judge Fred Moore.

The Gattis vs. Kilgo damage suit is  
not to be tried at this term of court af-  
ter all, an order being made this morn-  
ing that it be continued until time as  
shall be agreed for Gov. Glenn to call a  
special term for its trial. The contin-  
uance was on affidavit by John C. Kilgo  
of Trinity College that W. R. Odell of  
Concord and Dr. Dred Peacock of High  
Point, important witnesses for the de-  
fense cannot be gotten here for the  
trial at this time. A motion by the  
defence to continue some days ago on  
account of the death of Washington  
Duke at Durham was refused.

The North Carolina Grand Lodge of  
Masons today elected and installed of-  
ficers and adjourned to meet next year  
in Goldsboro. The grand officers are:  
grand master, Plato Collins, Kinston;  
deputy grand master, Thos M Stephens  
of Durham; grand warden, Perrin Bus-  
bee, Raleigh; grand secretary, E. H.  
Woodell, Raleigh; grand representative  
H. E. Riggs, Raleigh; grand marshal,  
E. P. Alba, Winston; grand conductor  
T. L. Moore, Lexington; grand guar-  
dian, F. B. Johnson, Raleigh; grand her-  
ald, H. H. McCoy, Kinston; grand chap-  
lain, A. P. Barbee, Statesville.

The Grand Lodge levied a per capita  
tax of seventy cents—thirty cents each  
for the Orphans Home and Grand Lodge  
and ten cents for Home for Aged and  
Infirm. Salary of the grand secretary  
was increased to \$1,900, \$600 was ap-  
propriated for assistant grand secre-  
tary; \$500 was appropriated for travel-  
ing expenses of grand master.

The commencement of Shaw Univer-  
sity for colored people was held today,  
the annual address being by Rev. J. C.  
Masses, pastor of Tabernacle Baptist  
church. The graduates are six with  
degree of A. B.; two B. S.; one B.  
L.; eighteenth normal department;  
four, missionary training department;  
two blacksmithing, two bricklaying and  
plastering; one drawing and designing;  
one machine work, six in woodworking,  
fourteen in woodworking department,  
four in cooking, Honorary degree do-  
ctor of divinity on Rev. Jas H. Lee,  
Washington D. C. and Rev. W. A.  
Pattis, Oxford.

In Wake Superior Court this morning  
Sam Yarborough who has been in jail  
without bail for the killing of Charles  
Falcon, colored, some weeks ago near  
Halifax was released on bail, there be-  
ing some doubt as to guilt even of  
murder. The negro was killed with  
a bare ball bat, in self defense it  
is claimed.

The secretary of State authorizes  
the dissolution of the Carolina Spoke  
and Binding Co., of Greensboro by  
mutual consent of stockholders, J.  
H. Wood and J. H. W. With being  
among them. The Guilford Planter Co.  
of Greensboro is chartered with \$5,000  
capital and \$25,000 authorized, the  
stockholders being J. H. White and  
others. The company will deal in  
southern supplies. Another charter is  
to the Water Lumber Co. of Asheville.
