GOVERNOR OF BAKU

Killed by Bomb. Outrage Supposed Work of Armenians.
Baku, Caucasus, May 25.—The Governor of Baku, Prince Nakachidze, was assassinated by a bomb, which was thrown at his carriage. A lieutenant, who was accompanying the governor, and a bystander were also killed by the explosion, and the coachman is believed to have been fatally injured.

St. Petersburg, May 25.—Though no details of the assassination of Prince Nakachidze have been received, the impression here is that the outrage was the work of the Armenian revolutionary committee in revenge for the attitude taken by the Prince during the racial war between Armenians and Tartars in February last, and is not attributable to the Russian terrorists, even though the latter are at present extremely active in many parts of the empire. The Armenians laid the responsibility for the deaths of those slain in February at the door of Prince Nakachidze.

NEEDS RELIAD TRACK

Opinion of Corporation Commission Regarding Yadkin Railway.

Guilford Battle Ground Unveiling, Standard Oil Company Offers Reward, Trap Shoot Tournament, Dakota Bond Matter. Granted 50 Year Franchise.

Raleigh, May 25.—Complaint was made to the Corporation Commission of the condition of the Yadkin railway, a line from Salisbury to Norwood, Stanley county. The corporation has made an order that on account of the heavy grades, and the large amount of freight traffic and further on account of the curves in the road, the track ought to be re-laid with rail of at least 60 pound to the yard the present rail being not over 50 pounds, and that the defective cross ties ought to be replaced by sound iron and the road bed given such attention as to make it safe.

Professor W. A. Withers of the Agricultural and Mechanical College has been in correspondence with the War Department regarding the monument to General William Lee Davidson, which the government will erect at the battle ground of Guilford court house and which will be unveiled July 4th. He was able to give the War Department a record that it did not have, namely the date of the commission of General Davidson, this being August 31, 1780 by acts of legislature. The fact will be stated upon the bronze tablet upon the monument. The address at the unveiling will be delivered by Major William A. Graham of Lincoln county.

On the first of June, Mr. William R. Crawford Jr., of this city will marry Miss Elizabeth Kirby, of Goldsboro. Mr. Crawford was for many years the steward at the State hospital for the insane here, of which Miss Kirby's father, the late Dr. George L. Kirby was superintendent.

The crops of small grain in this section of the State make a very good appearance and the cool weather does not appear to have injured them.

The Standard Oil Company has offered a reward of \$1,000 for information that will secure the conviction of the person or persons who murdered night watchman Strickland, blew open the safe and set fire to the warehouse. As has been stated, the people living in the neighborhood have protested against the rebuilding on the same spot, and the chief of police has declined to grant a rebuilding permit. The new building will probably be well out in the suburbs, so as to minimize the danger to the city from the fire. Had the wind been blowing when the fire occurred last week, it would have been hard to prevent much destruction of other property.

Insurance commissioner Young has occupied his new office in a leased building, and finds it particularly convenient. His office has been on the third floor of the capitol, inconvenient for him and the public as well, there being no elevator in the building.

President George L. Lyon, of the North Carolina trap shooters association has completed the arrangement for the tournament, which will be at Durham June 14th and 16th. The first tournament was held here last summer.

For nearly two months the board of aldermen has been trying to elect a city attorney, but there is a complete dead lock, three candidates being in the field.

The complete settlement has now been made by this State for the bonds held by South Dakota and by Schaefer Bros. of New York, and the incident, so to speak, appears to be closed. The governor and treasurer have been to New York and made settlements. Ex-Gov. Russell and others no doubt wish to collect on all the special tax bonds, of which the total amount authorized by the carpet bag legislatures were something over \$25,000,000 of which over two thirds was actually loaned. The treasurer says that the State received for these really only \$200,000.

The aldermen of Raleigh have granted an extension of the franchise of the Raleigh Electric Railway, so as to make it run for 50 years from this date the company agreeing to build two miles of new track in a year and to operate the line to the Union Station, Raleigh being perhaps the only place in the country with a street car system without a depot connection.

DANGEROUSLY CUT.

Isaac Wayne Hughes Receives Painful Wounds At The Hands of a Negro.

But for timely interference in a fight last evening between Isaac Hughes, the son of Dr. Frank Hughes, and Austin Hill, a negro fireman at Brooks steam laundry, the former would undoubtedly have been killed. The young man is painfully but not seriously wounded and will not suffer great inconvenience but he had a very narrow escape from death. The cause of the trouble seems to have been over a boat which Isaac owned and but which the negro, Hill, claimed and had used considerably. Yesterday Isaac was painting the boat and the negro interfered insisting that the boat was his. During the course of the controversy the negro called him a liar upon which the latter took after Hill and ran him to the laundry where he disappeared and Isaac went away. Later in the evening as the negro sat in front of the laundry on Middle street whittling a block of wood Isaac appeared on the scene and the trouble was renewed and as they clinched Hill used the open knife freely on the boys neck and face barely escaping the jugular vein. Hill was in a state bordering on a frenzy and would have committed murder in another instant had not John Williams, who keeps a restaurant near by, rushed in, pulled Hill off and pushed him into the laundry, standing in the door to prevent the negro's getting out. Hill had procured a hatchet and would have attacked the wounded boy with it if he had been allowed the chance. Fear the police and knowing that the clamor caused by the disturbance would make his case the more serious Hill lost no time in getting away unobserved. Policeman John Bowden was the first on the scene and gave chase to the man but was unable to catch him.

Isaac was taken to his home and his injuries which at first appeared to be very bad were dressed by his father; but after the necessary attention they were found to be harmless in themselves but very close to the jugular vein. A wound on the wrist required a few stitches.

Public feeling was aroused by the affair and if the negro had been caught at once he would have been roughly treated. He is reported as an ugly and desperate man and as having had frequent fights before but none of this serious character.
