WASHINGTON LETTER

(Special Correspondence.)

"Before the summer is over in Washington those who are acquainted with Senator Charles Dick of Ohio may expect to see him blossoming forth wearing one of the finest Panama hats, with possibly few exceptions, ever brought to the United States," said Consul General Dietrich of Guayaquil, Ecuador, who is in the national capital on leave.

The newest and most fashionable hat among the women of Washington, in which not only "society" is engaged, but "the out" as well, is the weaving of rugs and carpets—exactly like those that our grandmothers used to make, except that they are not made of wool, but of silk, rayon, or other synthetic materials.

Representative Bede of Minnesota and Guy A. Eaton, commander of the naval militia at Duluth, were in Washington recently to see about the gunboat Fern. The navy department some time ago turned the Fern, which was formerly used by the naval battalion of the District, over to the Duluth naval militia, but would not make any repairs or deliver the vessel.

Commander Eaton is here to arrange for the completion of the repairs, which are being made in a shipyard at Norfolk at a cost of about \$4,000 and to have the vessel taken to Duluth, which will cost about \$1,000. It is not expected that the navy department will ask for the return of the vessel and that it will pass permanently into the hands of the Duluth militia.

The insect pests that annually prey upon the shade trees of the national capital are beginning to make their appearance in formidable numbers, and before long their depredations will be in evidence all over the city. There is a grain of consolation, however, in the fact that of the three kinds of insects that annually do the greatest amount of damage to the trees of Washington—which constitute one of the city's chief claims to beauty—only one, the fall webworm, appears to have made a good start.

The German government has purchased a splendid site for its embassy here opposite the property of the new French embassy overlooking Sheridan circle in S street, in the southwest section of the city. The property, which is shaded by magnificent trees and rises to a great height above the street, measures about 300 by 105 feet. On this site will be erected a splendid stone structure of the style of Frederick the Great, reproducing perhaps in general outline the famous Sans Souci castle or the new castle in Potsdam.
