## RALEIGH

### The Capitol Square Will be Paved With Brick.

A Tomato Vine That Beats the Record. The "Home Coming" at Shelby to be a Fine Affair. A Baseball Coach Secured. Johnston County to be Dry Monday, August 28th.

Raleigh, Aug. 14.—State Auditor Dixon left this afternoon to participate in the "Home Coming" exercises at Shelby, this week. He delivers an address Wednesday. Governor Glenn is to go there Thursday to deliver an address in the same connection. Some of the other prominent speakers for the week are United States Senator Lee S. Overman and Col. John R. Conningham.

The Council of State propose to have all the walks in Capitol Square paved with brick this fall in compliance with an act passed by the last legislature providing that this work shall be done with convicts from the penitentiary with bricks made in that institution. In this way there will be no expenditure of money. There are two immense cisterns, one at the southwest and the other at the Northeast corner of the Capitol that will have to be filled in before this work can be done. They were put there when the Capitol was first built and before Raleigh had any works for fire protection. They have been in use for many years, but are full of water all the time.

Col. L. Tomofski, deputy clerk of the United States Court here, says he has a tomato vine in his yard eight feet high, six feet in diameter and 32 lbs long, from which he has gathered 720 tomatoes and he expects to gather many more before frost. The vine extends 22 feet on the ground.

The A. & M. College Athletic Association announces that they have secured M. J. Miltredge, a national league ball player, to coach the baseball team for the season of 1905. He coached the Holy Cross College team for a number of years, this team having last year defeated Harvard, Yale, Cornell, Georgetown and other prominent teams. He was on the Boston National League team when they held the championship. The prospect has been bright for the A. & M. team. Wilson, Parkins, Sykes, Snider, Gergory, Hardie and others of the players last season will return. They have already been scheduled with the University of North Carolina and the University of Virginia, V. M. I. V. P. I., Washington and Lee and other institutions.

The last Saturday in this month Johnson county will take her place among the absolutely prohibition counties of the State. There has not been a saloon in Johnson county for a long while except at Henson, but six months ago there were six dispensaries in the county but next Saturday, a week, the last one of these will pass out of existence and the prohibition regulations will be so stringent that not even cider can be sold unless made by the seller.

## BEAUTIFUL CHINA PAINTING.

Samples of Miss Elma Basnight's Work on Exhibition at S. K. Eatons Store.

Some beautiful specimens of china painting may be seen in one of the show windows of S. K. Eatons store. It is the handwork of Miss Elma Basnight, daughter of Mr. J. S. Basnight and it certainly reflects great credit on the young lady's ability as an artist.

The pieces are varied but all perfect in their way. The delicate colorings, the true sense of natural hues and positions and the artistic poses appeal to the eye as the accomplishment of a thing that is required of china painting. Among the particularly attractive pieces is a salad bowl, which is painted on the inside in rich purple; the inside is finished with an opal lustre making a fine harmony of colors. The entire display, consisting of cups, tea plates, tea saucers, dresser ornaments and bon-bon dishes shows Miss Basnight's work to be of a very high order of merit.
