COTTON GROWERS ASSOCIATION.

President Harvie Jordan Tells of Its Influence.

He Estimates Crop Nine to Ten Half Millions Bales. Hearing Begun in Case of Nall, Raleigh and Pamlico By Construction.

Raleigh, N. C., Sept. 1.—President Harvie Jordan of the American Cotton Growers Association is here as the special guest of the State Farmers Convention which he addressed at the Agricultural and Mechanical College today. He was especially interviewed by your correspondent who complimented him upon the wonderful work done in reducing the acreage of cotton and in holding the crops, and in the securing of good prices. Mr. Jordan said: "We have done very well for boys so far, but we will show the world later what men we are. We do not desire or intend to sit down on our laurels. To give you an idea of our power as an association, the correspondence yesterday between Theodore Price and myself tore the market to pieces. The Southern Cotton Association today has a more powerful influence on the cotton situation than anything else in the world. I want to say that this is the first time that the world has paid any attention to farmers. It is true that the elements this year have aided us, but our own efforts have counted for a great deal. The elements have always been giving us aid, but this happens to be the first time in the minds of some people that they have helped us. The cotton crop will not be a large one this year, yet it will be larger than it has been in some years. Sentiment is crystallizing in the direction of a more complete organization. We are not going to take anything for granted, but we are going to do things ourselves, not wait for them to happen, but go out and get what we want. The figures on this season's crop run all the way from nine to ten and a half million bales. The best opinion is that the crop is one-third off. That I am told is about the figure in North Carolina also, as it is elsewhere. When our association meets at Asheville on the 6th inst. we will prepare an estimate which will show exactly what the crop is, and we will give this to the world at noon on the 7th. It will be a full and fair report. Our organization is becoming very firmly welded together. North Carolina has done well and has certainly done her part in reducing the acreage. The farmers in this State are very loyal and very enthusiastic. Many more farmers arrived today to attend their State convention. Among them was A. G. Coward of Grifton, Lenoir county, who had not been to Raleigh before since the inauguration of Governor Vance, January 1, 1877. The attention of the farmers to the speeches was very marked. A number of them today, under the direction of Prof. Burkett of the college made an early morning trip through the big farm and there were short running talks as they went from crop to crop.

Very good progress is now being made in the construction of the Raleigh & Pamlico Railway, a dozen miles having been finished from here northeastward. Crabtree Creek would have been crossed by bridges three times within a distance of a couple of miles had not Superintendent Turner thought of the plan of changing the course of the creek so that only one bridge had been made necessary. A great many persons went out to the Agricultural and Mechanical College this afternoon to see the dedication of the new agricultural building, one of the most beautiful public buildings in the State. Governor Glenn was not present but Lt. Gov. Winston represented him as one of the official speakers. Governor Glenn will send through Brig. Gen. Armistead an invitation to all the National Guard of this State to be present at the occasion of the visit of the president to Raleigh in October. There are no funds to meet the expenses and so they will have to be met by the troops. Tests will be put on the golf links on the fair grounds for all who come.

This morning Governor Jordan began the hearing in the case of Nall, the patient at the Central Hospital here who died last week under suspicious circumstances, charges of cruelty having been made. Superintendent McKee of the hospital wrote a letter to Solicitor Jones asking that he take the matter up immediately and make the necessary investigations to exonerate the hospital of any blame which could possibly be attached to it, saying that if it had been made the owner could have examined the body before it left for Chatham county, to be buried and further that he would be glad if solicitor would order the body to be brought back to Raleigh and autopsied to determine the exact cause of death. He also wrote a letter to coroner Jordan, stating that he had written the solicitor and that he desired a searching investigation. The statement has been made that there was a large crowd over the case of Nall. The coroner who examined him says that there were three men in the room who were with him at the time he died.

CONFEDERATE PENSIONERS

Roster Completed For This Year. Sup. Joyner And Dr. Molver On For Europe.

Special to Journal. Raleigh, Sept. 1.—State Auditor Dixon has completed this year's roster of Confederate pensioners. There are 14,035, an increase of 719 over last year. Of these 8,944 are soldiers of the 4th class, an increase of 616, and 5,099 widows, and increase of 119.

A Throne Without an Heir. It is one of the many bizarre peculiarities of Constantinople that no one, not even the most experienced diplomatist, appears to understand the character of the next heir. They might not choose the eldest son, whether brother or son, but they certainly will not step outside the house of Osman, and the new sovereign might possibly be a very able man. No reigning house has ever produced so many men of the first force as that of Osman.—London Spectator.
