A SQUARE TEST

As to Power of Police Justice Over Criminals.

Van Police Justice Imposes Fine or Send to Bonds. Question of Jury Trial. The Half Case the Banishment. Liquor Dealers Failed By Sixteen Names.

Raleigh, Sept. 8.—Governor Glenn leaves tomorrow for the New England States on his speaking tour, and will return about the end of the month. While away he will of course be the recipient of many social functions.

A square test is to be made of the law by which the police justice of this city can send persons to the roads or can impose fines, all without a trial by jury. In the case of the woman convicted of keeping a disorderly house in the tenderloin district here, Bertha Brown, by name, she was fined \$100. In another case a negro was sentenced to the roads for 90 days for gambling and another for six months for assault with deadly weapon. Attorney J. C. L. Harris said today that he had for some time been waiting for an opportunity to make a test case and so took this matter, as regards these three persons, before Judge Purnell of the Federal court. The contention of Mr. Harris is that a warrant on information and belief, such as were those in these cases, is illegal and void, and second that it is in violation of the 14th amendment of the United States constitution, to deny a trial by jury. He cites in point the case of Jameson vs. Wimbush, this being the case decided by Judge Emory Spear from Georgia, and also a case from Ohio, that of Callahan vs. Wilson, decided by Judge Harlan of the United States Supreme court. Mr. Harris says the State of Georgia never appeals from the decision of Judge Spear. The case recently came before the Supreme court from Asheville, but Attorney Harris says does not apply to the cases now taken before Judge Purnell, under habeas corpus proceedings. The Supreme court held that the legislature had a right to give a police justice power to try, as a magistrate has it, and to further give jurisdiction of all the petty misdemeanors. The recorder of Charlotte binds over, while the police justice here imposes direct sentences. It seems that there is also a change in the road law here in Wake county by which the county commissioners, as commissioners of roads have the power to take prisoners from jail, to which they have been sentenced, and put them on the road for the term of sentence.

There is a great deal of talk now about the terrible affair at the Central Hospital and it appears to be the general opinion that it will take a greater extent than it first appeared and may lead to a wide inquiry. The directors meet next Wednesday and will take up the whole question of management and treatment of patients here. From time to time wild stories have been current, but happily these when run down have proved in the past to be baseless, one or two other rumors are current, which no doubt will be investigated. The judicial proceeding in the Hall case will also be wide-reaching in their character. It was thought that perhaps the coroner's jury would bring in some other persons in its findings, but it did not do so.

The liquor dealers here failed by 16 names to get enough to have the Board of Aldermen call an election on the question of open saloons, so this matter goes over until next year.

SEARCHING INQUIRY

Asked By Governor On Hall Case And Investigation Into Central Hospital Affairs.

Raleigh, N. C., Sept. 8th.—Governor Glenn this evening on the eve of leaving the State wrote every director of the State Hospital for the insane here, not only to fully investigate the death of Thomas Hall, a patient, but also to make diligent inquiry whether any other inmate has been harshly or indignantly treated by any officer or attendant and to go to the bottom of everything so the public can fully know the condition of affairs. The testimony is to be sworn to and taken stenographically and filed with the Governor.

THE JAPANESE RIOTS

Hostility Against Americans Because of Peace Treaty. Churches Burned. News Papers Favor Mob.

Tokio, Sept. 8.—Martial law rules Tokio today. Notwithstanding this fact, however, and that the military force has been increased the temper of the people has not been subdued. Rioting was resumed last night and under cover of darkness the mob wrought great damage. An attempt was made to cut off the city's light supply despite troops, nearly succeeded. Falling in this the mob tied up the tramway, service the rioters stopping the cars in the street and setting them on fire. Several buildings were also burned including the police station and several sub-stations. The mob surged about the Imperial hotel which is at present filled with foreign guests. E. H. Harriman is stopping at this hotel. The demonstrations have taken an anti-foreign turn as well as being anti-government and troops are stationed about the Imperial to protect the guests. The government also has troops guarding foreign legations. The best indication of the feeling against foreigners is illustrated in the burning of ten Christian churches and one mission. The newspapers with the exception of the government organ have taken sides with the mob and their utterances have been far from pacific. One of the most radical of these organs has been suppressed. The main agitation is against Americans for somehow the idea prevails that pressure from Mr. Roosevelt and the American government caused the acceptance of the peace terms which the Japanese consider humiliating.

DESTROYED BY ARMY WORM.

Craven County Cotton Shrinks Thirty Per Cent By The Pest. Remedy To Kill Army Worm.

The farmers of Craven county are wrestling with the army worm problem. Its ravages extend to all parts of the county but seem to be worse in the vicinity of New Bern.

The writer went out Friday to ascertain the damage being done, and found several cotton fields where the plants were entirely devoid of leaves, nothing being left except the stalk and bolls. The crops of Messrs. Spencer, Jones, Ellis, Thornton and Crockett seem to have suffered worse than others, the damage being not less than one half, or in other words, where a yield of one and one-half bales of cotton was expected to the acre, not more than three-quarters of a bale will be gathered.

In most low places where the land is rich, it is noticed that the worm has made attack, but where the land is poor the crop has not been troubled and it is said that the worm will not thrive on poor land. It is safe to say that the damage to the cotton crop of Craven county by this pest so far is 30 per cent.

The worm made its appearance about ten days ago and its ravages have been swift and severe. In some instances the spread has been checked, and on the farm of Mr. W. H. Bray, not only has it been checked but the worm has been destroyed. Mr. Bray has already had some experience with the pest and early began a fight to save his crop. The difference in the appearance of the plants on either side of Neuse road will show that Mr. Bray has won out in the fight. On his farm the cotton is in a fine thrifty condition, covered with a heavy green foliage, while across the road the plants are stripped entirely of leaves, the naked stalks supporting its product of bolls which are already beginning to shrivel up.

Mr. Bray in our interview said that the saving of his crop was due to spraying with a solution of Bordeaux mixture and Paris green.

Paris green in solution is said to be effective but improved by the addition of the Bordeaux mixture, that mixture causing a better adhesion of the poison to the plants.

Mr. Bray very kindly gave the formula of the solution which the Journal is pleased to publish that it may be of benefit to the farmers in case the army worm makes an invasion another season. The following is the solution: To 45 gallons of water add 5 gallon Bordeaux mixture and one pound of Paris Green, mix thoroughly and spray.

YOUNG MAN DROWNED.

Nelson Parsons Attempts to Swim From Sinking Boat to Shore But Falls.

Wednesday afternoon Nelson Parsons a white boy, aged 17 years was drowned near Tootley Landing, on the Pamlico county side of Broad Creek.

Parsons and another young man named Troy Price were in bathing and they got on a log and pushed out into the middle of the stream towing a boat. When they wanted to get back to land young Parsons said he couldn't swim and was going back in the boat. Both got into the boat when it began to fill with water and sank, the creek at that place being about ten feet deep. Young Parsons, when he saw that they could not get the boat ashore, struck out and endeavored to reach land but his efforts were unsuccessful. Young Price tried to save him but could not reach him. He never appeared after going down the second time.

Price hurried to shore to get help and two or three other men responded to his calls. They worked nearly two hours before finding the body.
