## RALEIGH.

Rain Needed. Appeals Fourth District. Exhibit for State Fair. Historical Society Meeting.

Raleigh, Sept. 19.—Rain is now needed through this section of the State, the farmers say. Cotton is opening very rapidly.

The Supreme court today took the docket of appeals from the fourth district, a number of lawyers being present, among them J. B. Schulken, Whiteville; David T. Cates, Fayetteville; F. S. Spruill and Wiley M. Persons, of Louisburg; A. W. Graham, Oxford; F. A. Woodard, Wilson; C. M. T. Fountain, Tarboro; J. A. Grantham, Goldsboro, and Gilchrist McCormick, Maxton.

Mr. Oates of Fayetteville says the County of Cumberland will make a very fine exhibit at the fair, and it has secured an excellent section of the building for this purpose. The great silk mill of Fayetteville will make a great show on that occasion.

Three new rural free delivery mail routes are established: Fairfield, Jas. C. Watson, carrier; Gastonia, Thos. K. Dilling; Vineland, Roland R. Hill.

The program for the fifth annual meeting of the State Literary Historical Society at the Roney Literary Oct. 17th, is announced, beginning at 8 p. m. There will be short addresses by Armistead Burwell of Charlotte, Locke Craig of Asheville and Claude Kitchen of Scotland Neck of a petition to the legislature to place a statue of Z. B. Vance in Statuary Hall in the Capital at Washington. President Robert W. Winston will deliver the annual address subject: "A Plea for State Unity." Prof. D. H. Hill will speak of North Carolina Books during the present year. There will be a discussion by Senator Overman and Congressman Small and Thomas of the need of a fireproof State Library and enlargement of the State Capitol. Officers will be elected and the cup presented by Mrs. Lindsay Patterson of Winston-Salem will be awarded.

## Old North State.

The following lines were written on a scrap of blotting paper by the author who requests that his name be withheld, upon a visit to Cedar Grove Cemetery of this city, where he saw the tomb of Wm. Gaston—author of the patriotic song, "Old North State."

"I have always," says the writer, "had a passionate love for poetry, and this piece especially. When ever I would hear it, my heart would be filled with a longing—with a desire that words could not express—that life could not satisfy."

"Before the strains of the Old North State, all other rhythm and beauty would fade to nothingness. The sweet lines of Milton, which at other times possessed such mystic charms of beauty and light were then reduced to simple words void of all euphony. The silvery notes which fell as shining pearls from the throat of the little mocking bird, when compared with the angelic sweetness of "Old North State," lost all of their harmony and charm and were only simple chirps."

"It is simple, it is sweet, it is grand and should be memorized by every true Carolinian. It should be taught to the school children in their tender years thus linking their hearts closely to their native State. The "Old North State, Forever," is a good motto."

## IN MEMORIAM.

Our community was saddened by the death of Lewis Albert Thomas, which occurred Friday, September 15th, about 6 o'clock in the afternoon, after a brief illness. Mrs. Duffy of New Bern, Disoway of Maysville, and Blount of Swansboro, were the doctors in attendance. They pronounced the disease as Congestion of the Brain and other internal organs. But alas! medical skill was unavailing and after laying in agony, moving neither his limbs nor speaking for three whole days and nights, death quietly relieved him of his suffering. His remains were interred in the burial grounds at Tabernacle Church.

He was a son of Mr. and Mrs. Lewis B. Thomas, of Olympia, Pamlico county, N. C., and came to this place about two years ago, where he was general manager of the Swansboro Land and Lumber Company's logging business at this place, and at the time of his death was at his uncle's, Mr. D. S. Aman. He leaves a father, mother, four brothers and three sisters besides a host of relatives and friends to mourn his death.

He was but 25 years of age, just in the dawn of a glorious and promising manhood, and was a man of remarkable energy and ability. He was a prominent and successful business man and was liked and respected by every one who knew him. He was of good Christian character, a devoted son and brother, and with his kind and jovial disposition, readily made friends with every one he met, all of whom are shocked at his untimely death. But bereaved family and friends, weep not for is not our loss Heaven's and our loved ones gain? Trust all to God. Remember that

"Nothing is our own,  
We hold our pleasures  
Just a little while  
Ere they are fled  
One by one life robs us  
Of our treasures  
Nothing is our own  
Except our dead."

Jesus is keeping watch over him. The angels are singing to him their sweet refrain and filling his pathway with thornless roses as he enters their throne.
