AUTOCRACY SURRENDERS

Czar issues Manifesto to People.

Text of the Document. Later About Same.

That People Dissatisfied Want Nobility Abolished and Universal Suffrage and Franchise to Women.

St. Petersburg, Oct. 30.—Imperial Manifesto was as follows:

"We, Nicholas the Second, by the grace of God, Emperor and Autocrat of all the Russias, Grand Duke of Finland, etc., declare to all our faithful subjects that the troubles and agitation in our capitals and in numerous other places fill our hearts with excessive pain and sorrow.

"The happiness of the Russian sovereign is indissolubly bound up with the happiness of our people, and the sorrow of our people is the sorrow of the sovereign.

"From the present disorders may arise great national disruption. They menace the integrity and unity of our Empire.

"The supreme duty imposed upon us by our sovereign office requires us to efface ourself and to use all the force and reason at our command to hasten in securing the unity and co-ordination on the power of the central government and to assure the success of measures for pacification in all circles of public life, which are essential to the well-being of our people.

"We, therefore, direct our government to carry out our inflexible will in the following manner:

"First. To extend to the population the immutable foundations of civic liberty, based on the real inviolability of the person, freedom of conscience, speech, union and association.

"Second. Without suspending the already ordered elections to the State Duma, to invite to participation in the Duma, so far as the limited time before the convocation of the Duma will permit, those classes of the population now completely deprived of electoral rights, leaving the ultimate development of the people of the electoral right in general to the newly established legislative order of things.

"Third. To establish as an unchangeable rule that no law shall be enforceable without the approval of the State Duma, and that it shall be possible for the election of the people to exercise real participation in the supervision of the legality of the acts of the authorities appointed by us.

"We appeal to all faithful sons of Russia to remember their duty towards the Fatherland, to aid in terminating these unprecedented troubles and to apply their forces in co-operation with us, to the restoration of calm and peace upon our national soil.

"Given at Peterhof, October 30, in the eleventh year of our reign.

(Signed.) NICHOLAS."

St. Petersburg, Oct. 31.—The delicious rejoicing of last night and early this morning over the manifesto of the Czar is being followed today by the adoption by people of a more critical attitude toward the reforms. The opinion is becoming general that the reforms promised must be widely extended or Russia will continue under autocratic rule, although with the popular assembly substituted for the bureaucracy. The first examination of the manifesto in which the constitution is proclaimed does not reveal any substantial gain of civic liberty over previous promises which have not been kept, except the extension of the franchise and establishment of a cohesive cabinet. There is nothing in the manifesto on the two vital principles of a constitutional government having the entire control of the finances through the popular assembly and the exclusive responsibility of the cabinet to assembly. Unless the Czar's advisors go far beyond the working of the manifesto in the working out of the details of the new form of government the agitation which has continued so long, culminating in the present gigantic strike will be unavailing. The leaders of the radical party will not support the manifesto. They intend to begin immediately the organization of workmen into a party which will demand first the abolition of the nobility and second universal suffrage, including the extension of the franchise to women, and third a complete local autonomy with local permanent studies in various State legislatures of America for the purpose of educating the people.

DISCREDIT THE STORY

That American Minister at Nanking, China, Was Attacked.

Washington, Oct. 31.—The Washington naval department received two dispatches from Admiral Train dated yesterday at Shang Hai. No mention is made in either of them about his having been attacked by a Chinese mob at Nanking. The target practice of the battleship Oregon is the subject of one message, while the other conveyed an expression of pleasure from the milkade at the visit of the American warships to Japan. In view of the receipt of these messages the navy department officials are disposed to discredit the story that Admiral Train and his son were attacked at Nanking, Shang Hai, from which the dispatches come is a long distance from Nanking, which fact tends to throw discredit upon the story of the attack.

Accent on the Operatic Stage.

No Englishman with daughters could do a rasher thing than permit them to take lessons from eminent professors with a view of going on the stage. The operatic stage in England scarcely exists. At Covent Garden a woman who can speak good English can only get in by force of social influence, and abroad a foreigner has very great difficulty because she cannot speak or sing with a perfect accent. The foreign lady or gentleman comes across here and on occasion will venture to sing in English, and their mistakes bring nothing more than a smile to the faces of the audience. But let an English singer go to France or Germany, and something totally different happens.

In 1877 Taniguo sang at Monte Carlo before an audience which was mainly French. He mispronounced a word, and a peal of derisive laughter covered even his stentorian notes. In Brussels I heard an American tenor laughed at because some of his vowels were not quite pure—Brussels, where their French is the most villainous patois I have ever heard. In Germany I have heard both French and English artists laughed at because their accent was not absolutely correct.—London Saturday Review.
