TUESDAY'S RESULTS

Summary of Elections in Various States and Cities.

New York City—McClellan, Democrat, is elected mayor by a small plurality. Jerome, independent, with Republican endorsement, wins by about 8,000 over James W. Osborne, Democrat. W. R. Hearst, Municipal Ownership mayorality candidate, charges fraud and declares he will contest election.

Philadelphia and Pennsylvania—A landslide buried the disreputable Republican machine under an adverse majority of 60,000 to 70,000. City Party sweeping the city—Berry, Democrat, with independent endorsement, carries the State for Treasurer.

Maryland—The defeat of the Poe disfranchisement amendment by 25,000, and election of Republican candidate for State comptroller. Legislature is in doubt.

Ohio—Fight on Gov. Herrick resulted in a Democratic landslide, the plurality being estimated as high as 60,000. Democrats carried Cincinnati as well as Cleveland. "Boss" Cox announces his retirement.

Virginia—The Democratic plurality is about 20,000, showing a recitifier, and the Republicans gain about nine members of the Legislature.

Massachusetts—Guild, Republican, carries the State for Governor by 29,485 plurality, and Draper, for Lieutenant Governor, by only 3,942.

Kentucky—Democrats will have a good majority in the Legislature electing Senator Blackburn's successor.

Rhode Island—Republicans elect Governor, and gain in the Legislature.

Chicago—Clean sweep by Republicans.

Dewey Begins His Sentence.
Raleigh, Nov. 8.—T. W. Dewey, defaulting cashier of the Farmers and Merchants Bank of New Bern, entered last evening on the service of his six year sentence in the penitentiary. His coming to the penitentiary was quite unique. He arrived this morning at 8:40, greeted none of his friends but went directly to the penitentiary, spending the day there as a guest looking over the institution. This afternoon Sheriff Bidde of Craven county arrived and drove to the penitentiary, finding Dewey there and went through the formal ceremony of delivering Dewey to the authorities and receiving a receipt for him. Dewey had been out on \$40,000 bond since his conviction pending the appeal to the Supreme Court by whom the sentence was affirmed Oct. 3. It has required the time since then to certify the finding of the Supreme Court down to the Craven court. Dewey is in excellent health and seemed cheerful, he said he has made up his mind not to worry any more over his fate and will serve his sentence as patiently as he can.

A SERIOUS ACCIDENT
Mr. James S. Lane fearfully hurt in a Peculiar Manner.
Mr. James S. Lane, an aged and prominent resident of Pamlico county, met with an accident yesterday of such a serious nature that great fears are entertained for his recovery. About 9 o'clock he was letting his mule drink at the fountain on Broad street. He had removed the halter in order that it might drink more freely. The animal, feeling the absence of the bits started off on a trot. Mr. Lane ran along with the mule taking hold of the shaft and tried to reach the head and stop it, but as it reached Middle street it turned to the north and he fell into a run, the old man keeping up with it but when opposite Mr. Sultans' house, Mr. Lane was hit by the wheel of the cart and thrown down, he tried to rise but was knocked down again and the wheel ran over almost the entire length of his body and foot was caught in the wheel. He was dragged a few feet when the mule broke loose, kicking the prostrate man on the head before doing so.

Charlie Beatty, the colored employee of Dr. J. W. Duguid was the first to go to the injured man to render assistance, he was helped by several spectators and he was taken to Dr. Duguid's office where it was seen that the most serious injury was of a very serious nature. A rib was broken but the worst condition was internal hemorrhages which made his case very grave. He was taken to the home of Mrs. Bosley Cuthrell on Graves street where he was given the very best of attention and his condition can be watched by his physician, Dr. Duguid.

THE CONSECRATED TONGUE.

Evangelist Stuart Tall's Tongue Can Promote the Interests of Christ's Kingdom.

The morning meeting at the Methodist church yesterday was the most impressive held yet. The Holy Spirit has taken possession of the city and the people go almost en masse to receive the blessing and inspiration imparted at these meetings. It is the greatest revival ever held in the city and there has been no time when there has been so much serious thinking.

The discourse was as all his morning sermons are, on the text in Acts 2:4; "They were with one accord in one place." The remarks were on the line of prayer and praise. The ministry of song, the smile and the pleasant word all had a blessing which in some future time would surely have its results. He told of several beautiful incidents and that narrative was the means of some making a profession.

At the end there was a remarkable and a most affecting scene. When Mr. Stuart asked for those who have been praying for the meetings, and for their friends, to go forward to the altar or kneel where they were sitting. The invitation was no more than made before the altar and all the front seats were filled with praying men and women and all over the house persons were seen kneeling in silent prayer. Petitions were offered by several people and afterward the evangelist asked all who desired to live a better life to stand, in response about 25 persons stood.

The night meeting was another wonderful demonstration of the power of the Holy Spirit. The congregation seemed to be led by that mysterious influence which has developed in a most marvelous manner. Each meeting surpasses the preceding ones in interest and while the number of converts does not seem to increase greatly enough interest is manifested to show that an unusual experience is gained. The sermon was unusually strong and searching discourse on the well known text, "Be not deceived, God is not mocked, for whatsoever a man soweth that shall he also reap." The process of sowing and reaping was explained and the analogy between physical sowing and spiritual sowing was clearly defined. He uttered striking and terrible truths and made some words picture which not one of the audience will forget; so vivid was the language. The number of people who professed conversion was notably increased.

The President and The South.
Collier's For November 11 says: Never were two weeks spent to better advantage than those devoted by President Roosevelt to his dash through the South. The President cleared up all the misunderstandings that had alienated a section temperamentally in sympathy with him, and did it without abating or concealing any part of his principles. There were only two flaws in the pure delight of his excursion—one the irreconcilable hostility of Governor Vardaman of Mississippi, which deprived the President and the people of that State of the mutual pleasure of a meeting, and the other the promptly rebuked indiscretion of Governor Davis of Arkansas in making the Presidential reception the occasion for a harangue in favor of lynch law. The little incident of the collision after leaving New Orleans, when the President's steamer had to be heached to keep her from sinking, is not to be entered on the debit side of the ledger. CLERK-CARRIER EXAMINATION.
To Be Held in New Bern Saturday November 25th.

The United States Civil Service Commission announces that on the date and at the place named above an examination will be held for the positions of clerk and carrier in the Post-Office Service. Appointments of letter carriers are made to the class having the minimum rate of pay and promotions from the lower grades are made to the next higher grade at the expiration of one year's service. A substitute letter carrier receives a compensation of \$1 per annum and the pro rata compensation of the carrier whose route he may be required to serve. A vacancy in the regular force of carriers must be filled by the promotion of the senior substitute. A substitute clerk is paid a rate of compensation not exceeding that of the compensation of the absent clerk or employee whose place he takes. All original appointments of clerks are made at the minimum salaries. Age limit all positions, 18 to 45 years. All applicants must have the medical certificate in the application blank executed. Male applicants must be at least 5 feet 4 inches in height in bare feet, and weigh not less than 125 pounds. From the eligibles resulting from this examination, certification will be made to existing and future vacancies. For application blank, full instructions, etc., application should be made to the secretary of the board of examiners at the postoffice. No application will be accepted for this examination unless received by the undersigned prior to the hour of closing business on November 22nd 1905.
