### Last Call For Trees.

The Woman's Club have canvassed the town and placed lists with varieties and most reasonable prices both at the Journal office, and Davis' Pharmacy. With all this expenditure of time and energy less than sixty trees, exclusive of the oaks, have been secured. The rates have been given for lots of one hundred; fewer will cost each individual about 10 cents more per tree.

The order will be sent in by the 20th and we urge upon the citizens to avail themselves of this opportunity to secure beautiful young shade trees.

The question of paying for the trees has been most anxiously discussed, and as the club has no funds, they hesitate to place an order, and take the risk of collecting when the trees are delivered. To look the situation squarely in the face the nursery man may not be so sure of the ability of the Woman's Club, as a body, to pay; long experience having taught that 100 per cent of collections are unusual. To prevent a possible refusal, and to make things easier, a committee will wait on all who have signified their intention of buying trees and collect in advance.

All persons who agree to this will be supplied, all who object, their names will be dropped from the list. The ladies are forced to do this as a protective measure, and hope none will conceive any personal element in it. No exceptions will be made, as cash must accompany the order.

The trees will be ordered from Mr. J. Van Lindley of Greensboro, one of the leading nursery-men of the country, and whose honest and square business methods have built up a large patronage. The prices are as follows:  
Pecans 45 cent each, 4 to 5 ft.  
Silver maples, 50 cent each, 12 to 14 ft.  
Sugar maples, 50 cent each, 12 to 14 ft.  
Elms 50 cent each, 4 to 7 ft.

### Practical Mill Instruction.

Raleigh, Nov. 11.—The Textile Department of the A. & M. College offers special courses of instruction for mill workers. The term begins January 3, 1906 and lasts ten weeks. Total expenses, including board, lodging, books tuition, textile material, etc., sixty dollars. The following subjects will be taught: Carding and spinning, weaving, designing and dyeing. The college is well equipped for textile instruction and these three weeks courses are arranged for the benefit of mill workers who already have experience and wish to perfect themselves along special lines.

### Values Advancing at New Orleans.

New Orleans, Nov. 11.—Following close on the heels of the raising of quotations, values in New Orleans have advanced rapidly. Stock Exchange shares now sell at \$7.00 each, while Cotton Exchange shares cannot be purchased at that figure. An extensive office of the Havana Road and Trust Company is authorized by the statement that the National affairs of the business men of New Orleans are today in much more comfortable condition than for some time past. The bank closed its doors for a few days.

### NOTICE!

To Druggists and Merchants Selling Patent Medicines, Bitters, Etc.

The Commissioner of Internal Revenue has ruled that alcoholic compounds advertised and sold as medicines, bitters, tonics, cordials, etc., which are composed chiefly of spirits or mixtures thereof without the addition of drugs or medicinal ingredients in sufficient quantities to change materially the character of the alcoholic liquor, are subjects of Special Tax; and on and after Dec. 1st, 1905, persons selling such compounds will be held liable to tax as liquor dealers.

The ruling that if such compounds are composed of spirits in combination with drugs, herbs, roots, etc., and are held out as remedies for diseases stated in labels on the bottles they are to be regarded as medicines until shown to have been sold for use as beverages is now revoked; and persons selling compounds as medicines are held accountable for the actual character thereof rather than what is stated in labels and printed matter sent out by the manufacturers.

The Proceeding at November Meeting. Petition for Bond Election. Shares and Treasurer File Reports.

The board met at 10 o'clock on Monday November 9th 1905 in regular session at the court house in New Bern, N. C.

Present commissioners, Foy, Harvey, Richardson, Wadsworth and Barrington. The report of Dr. J. F. Ehm, surgeon of health, upon being presented, was accepted and ordered filed and recorded.

Ordered that the valuation of property of H. B. Pearce on Middle street to be changed to \$2,500 on account of error.

Ordered that the valuation of the property of W. E. Rowe at 199 Pollock street be changed to \$900 on account of error.

The following Craven county road bonds of the denomination of \$500 each, having been paid by the treasurer:

viz: Nos. 124, 127, 128, 129, 132, 133, 134, 155, 156, 158, 178, 180, 189, 200, were destroyed by the chairman, in the presence of the board, and E. M. J. Waters, county attorney and Geo. H. J. Dixon poll-holders.

The report of the Auditing Committee, upon being read, was accepted and ordered filed and recorded.

The report of the Grand Jury was received and ordered filed and recorded. The Grand Jury in session makes the following report:

Have acted on thirty-two indictments.  
Have returned three for want of evidence.  
Have returned thirteen true bills.  
Have return 16 not true bills.  
Have made 3 indictments.  
Have carefully investigated the lynchings which occurred in the county, and find it impossible to get any information leading to conviction of the parties taking part in same.  
Have carefully examined Magistrate's report, and find correct.  
Have carefully examined Road Report, and find them in good shape.  
Have examined the County Jail, and find same in first class condition, that every room and cell are clean and every sanitary precaution used to protect the health of prisoners; that the sheriff is feeding prisoners with fair and wholesome food; Grand Jury would recommend that the Commissioners place water closets in cells and put in complete sewerage, also to put down bar-logs where necessary.  
Have also examined the County House and find it in perfect condition, and those at the house well cared for and receiving all attention necessary, would recommend that there be put in better condition, and that there is 17 colored inmates, and one white.

At which election the said voters of No. 1 Township shall vote upon subscription or no subscription of Twenty-Five Thousand (\$25,000) Dollars of the second mortgage, 5 per cent thirty year bond of the Raleigh and Pamlico Sound Railroad Company, in accordance with a petition filed before the Board of Commissioners.

It is further ordered by the Board of Commissioners, of Craven county, acting as for Township No. 1, that a new Registrar for said election be had as requested in said petition, and that the registration books shall be kept open, as is now required by law.

It is further ordered by the Board of Commissioners of Craven county that Wm. Cleve be appointed Registrar of Vanceboro precinct and N. M. Langestie and J. W. Stubbs poll-holders and is appointed Registrar for Maple Cypress precinct and J. T. Bland and J. J. Dixon poll-holders.

It is further ordered by the Board of Commissioners that a notice of said election shall be published in the New Bern Journal for thirty days, and be advertised in No. 1 Township, at the voting place, and two other public places in said Township.

Whereas a petition has this day been filed before our Board, requesting that an election be held in No. 2 township, Craven county, for the purpose hereinafter set out.

It is therefore ordered by the Board of Commissioners of Craven county, that an election be held in No. 2 township of said county, on Tuesday, December 12, 1905, according to the laws and regulations provided for the election of the members of the General Assembly. At which election the said voters of No. 2 township shall vote upon subscription or no subscription of ten thousand (\$10,000.00) dollars of the second mortgage. Five per cent, thirty year bond, of the Raleigh and Pamlico Sound Railroad Company, in accordance with a petition this day filed before the Board of Commissioners.

It is further ordered by the Board of Commissioners, of Craven county, acting as for said township No. 2, that a new registrar for said election be had as requested in said petition, and that the registration books shall be kept open, as is now required by law.

It is further ordered by the Board of Commissioners of Craven county, that N. T. Fulcher be, and is hereby appointed the registrar of said election and that F. A. Fulcher and Gilbert A. Gaskins be, and they are hereby appointed, judges of said election.

It is further ordered by the Board of Commissioners that a notice of said election shall be published in the New Bern Journal for thirty days, and be advertised in No. 2 township, at the voting place, and two other public places in said township.
