SHORT PASSING EVENTS.

Seed cotton was quoted yesterday at four cents.

The local cotton market prices took a range of from 11 to 12 cents—a larger variation than has been given for some time. Twenty-five bales were sold.

TRAGEDY IN CARTERET

Domestic Troubles End in Murder at Merrimon.

Bob Rice is confined in the Carteret county jail for the murder of Ed Lynch at Merrimon. The affair occurred last Sunday, and arose over domestic troubles of which Lynch is alleged to be the cause.

It is said that both Rice and Lynch formerly lived in Pamlico county and were on friendly terms. Lynch was accused by Rice as to his relations with Mrs. Rice and was repeatedly warned to cease. As a means to get free from Lynch, Rice moved to Merrimon but the former made frequent visits to Merrimon and was shot. The exact circumstances of the shooting are not known. Lynch died in a few hours as a result of the wound.

Rice went to Beaufort to give himself up and tells a story which all believe. He bears a good reputation and has the sympathy of the community.
