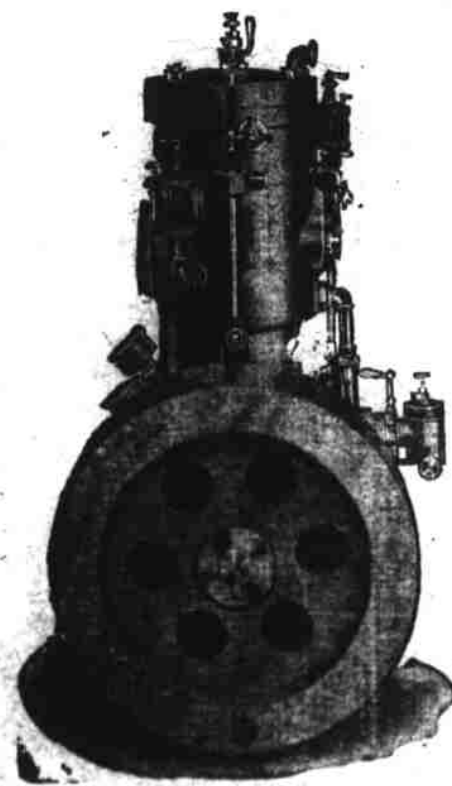

BAPTIST MEETINGS

Events of Interest at Convention and Woman's Missionary Sessions

Missionary to Japan Volunteers. Report on Wake Forest College. New Bern and Other Places Invite Convention Next Year. Talks on Several Missions by Women.

Special to Journal. Raleigh, Dec. 8.—At the State Baptist Convention this morning, there was an affecting scene when Rev. Mr. Willingham of Richmond, announced that in response to his appeal made last night, C. M. Rock of Magnolia, offered himself as a missionary to Japan. Rock made an affecting talk. The annual reports on State missions was made by M. J. Kestler. The special order was the report on Wake Forest College, made by President Potent, and Chairman Tyree, of the trustees.

A committee was appointed to recommend the place for the next convention Wilmington, New Bern, Henderson and Wayneville inviting it. Short speeches were made by representatives of various colleges, including President Brewer of the Seminary at Franklin, Va.

At the Woman's Missionary meeting auxiliary to the Baptist Convention, Mrs. Follett talked on Missionary journeys; Mrs. Lucretia Young and Rev. Livingston Johnson on State missions, Miss Maria Buhalmair of Baltimore, on Home missions, Mrs. A. J. Dunaway and Mrs. W. C. Tyree on Foreign missions.

There were conferences on training children in mission work, led by Miss Elizabeth Briggs and on Women's mission clubs, led by Miss Margaret Shields.

FINE COLLEGE SHOWING

And Baptists Greatly Pleased With Wake Forest.

Big Mineral Company Charter Granted. Work on Elks Temple. Bankrupt Firm. Declared Guilty of Murder but Out on Bail. Governor Appoints Directors Colored Orphanage at Oxford.

Raleigh, N. C., Dec. 8.—The Governor appoints Samuel P. Parker, K. L. Coley and W. H. Harrison directors of the colored orphan asylum at Oxford, to take charge immediately.

President Venable of the State University was talked with today and said that there were 661 students at present, and that everything was getting on admirably. President F. P. Hodgson of Oxford Female Seminary, where the building was recently burned said the loss had been adjusted and that it was very fully covered by insurance. The plans have been prepared for a building to replace one burned. It will be a duplicate of the latter with the exception of some changes in the interior.

Charters are granted the Mida Mineral Springs Company of Charlotte, authorized capital stock \$100,000, of which \$20,000 is preferred, the principal stockholders being J. W. Sample and W. W. Johnston of Charlotte, and Frank B. Sample of Palm Beach, Fla., also to the National Salvage Company of Greenville, which, strange to say is not a company to save wrecked vessels or cargoes, or to prevent damage by fires, but is merely a mercantile company.

As yet no arrests have been made of deputy revenue collectors Downing and Stowell, who were recently declared by the grand jury in Duplin county to be guilty of murder, the charge being that they shot a moonshiner. The officers are here on bail.

It is expected that the Baptist State Convention, the session of which began here Tuesday evening will adjourn its meeting Monday afternoon. More delegates came in today, but the number of these is not quite as large as expected, though there are more other visitors than usual, and the attendance at the meeting of the Woman's Missionary Union is exceptionally large.

Work on the Elks Temple here has now reached the second story, and it is seen that the building will be a very attractive one.

The firm of Whitley and Brother, general merchants here has gone into bankruptcy, the debts due amounting to a considerable sum.

The Baptists are greatly pleased at the progress of Wake Forest College, in which everyone of them feels such a pride. There is some kind of a division in the ranks of denominations which injures their colleges, and reduces the attendance, but this is not the case with the Baptists, who are as solid as a wall. Wake Forest does not allow having and the declarations made by President William I. Potent in his inaugural address yesterday show a view of this matter which is remarkable by many men of prominence in the State, ought to be taken by colleges everywhere. The declaration made by President Potent is as follows: "Having in its essence, no matter what its form, in a breach of the Christian Standard. A combination of cowardice and brutality in a crowd to take advantage of a single-handed opponent is intolerable and justifies the extreme measures to make it impossible."

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AIMS TO ENLARGE COMMERCIAL RELATIONS.

Congressman Thomas Favors a Reciprocity Measure. Believes It a Commercial Necessity.

Washington, D. C.—Representative Thomas, of North Carolina, who here says he is greatly interested in pushing such amendments to the proposed railway rate legislation as will place the refrigerator car companies and the private car lines under the jurisdiction of the interstate commerce commission.

"I am also interested," he continued, "in obtaining such reciprocal agreements with foreign countries as will expand our trade and give us new and wider markets, especially for southern products, such as cotton seed oil. If the 'stand pat' Republicans are in control and there can be no legislation looking to tariff revision, certainly something can be done in the way of reciprocity with other countries, in view of the retaliatory measures adopted by France, Germany and other European nations."

"I would like to see some amendment of the immigration laws which will effectually exclude such European labor as competes with American labor. More than one million Poles, Hungarians and Russians were immigrants to this country within the last year. We need a good class of immigrants to meet the labor situation in the south, but the lower order of European labor we do not need, and it should be excluded."
