FINE BANK EXHIBIT

Made By Corporation Commission's Report.

Wealth Increase Large During 1905. Shareholders Give Christmas Festival. Executive Committee State to Meet. Raleigh Gives to Poor Liberally. State Charter Granted.

Raleigh, N. C., Dec. 27.—The corporation commission today gave out its report on the condition of banks in the State at the close of business November 9th. The showing made is a very remarkable one. The total assets are \$41,095,589, an increase over one year ago of no less than \$9,491,356. There are 238 banks, and one year ago there were only 183. The deposits subject to checks aggregate \$27,720,128. The report shows in the clearest sort of a way a great prosperity of the State and the increase in wealth and general development.

State Treasurer Lacy's condition was improved today, members of his family stated. He has a mild attack of pneumonia, and they say he will be out in a few days.

The Governor was delighted at the Sunshiners Christmas Festival last night given to the poor children of the city, who were out by the hundreds. He said: "I desire to say that it is one of the very finest nights I ever saw in my life." The Governor was as full of interest in the matter as the children themselves.

The executive committee of the State fair will meet on Friday, and will wind up the affairs of the last fair, which was the most successful in all the long history of the association, and will also make many plans for the new year. Included in these will be material improvements, alterations, and additions to the present buildings, the grading to the front of the grounds, etc. There was a very great increase in the attendance over that of any previous year.

Mr. Joseph G. Brown, the president of the Associated Charities says that he fully believes Raleigh is more for the poor children, in the way of gifts and entertainment than any other place of its size in the country. The amount of attention paid them here is more than gratifying.

A charter is granted the Clayton Drug Company in Johnson county, and several amendments to charters of minor corporations were authorized by the Secretary of State today.

Soil Expert to Be Here

Before leaving Washington Senator Simmons requested the Department of Agriculture to send a soil expert to this section of the State to make an examination of our soils.

Yesterday he received a telegram from the department advising him that Prof. Spillman, one of the most eminent soil specialists in the employment of the Government, would arrive at New Bern this morning.

Prof. Spillman will remain in this immediate section about one week, and he at the Chattawka hotel. He will be pleased to see persons who wish their soil examined and analyzed. The National Department of Agriculture is greatly interested in the introduction of alfalfa and certain other new grasses in the South and is anxious to advise with our planters as to these grasses and to find out just what is needed to correct any conditions in our soils prejudicial to their growth.

Speaking of the value to the farmer of a knowledge of his soil, Senator Simmons said he had recently had samples of soil from his Jones county farm analyzed and as a result he would make a radical change in the kind of fertilizers he would use, having found that some of the constituent parts of that heretofore used are not needed on his land at all, while it needs a greater quantity of some other.

WOODMEN OF THE WORLD.

A Grand Time Coming for the Noble Order. Big Preparations Being Made for New Year's Celebration.

W. O. W. PROGRAM:
The parade will represent the Order of "Woodmen of the World" and will be participated in by Magnolia Camp of Goldsboro, Hollywood, Kingston and Elmwood Camp of New Bern.

The occasion is to celebrate the banner year of "Perfected Woodcraft", during which, more than 50,000 members were added to its poster, and \$3,000,000 paid out to widows and orphans.

The procession will organize at the Forest on Pollock street, and form in the following order:

- 1st.—Escort of City Police
- 2nd.—Camp escort with banner and "Old Glory."
- 3rd.—Marshals mounted on Mules.
- 4th.—Wagon with the K. of P. Band.
- 5th.—Officers on foot.
- 6th.—Cart drawn by oxen—Mayor's, Hood of Goldsboro, and Patterson of New Bern.
- 7th.—Sovereigns of the Order on foot.
- 8th.—Wagon drawn by oxen with String Band.
- 9th.—Sovereigns on foot.
- 10th.—Wagon with Santa Claus and protected children.
- 11th.—Sovereigns on foot.
- 12th.—Wagon with Accordion Corps.
- 13th.—Sovereigns on foot.
- 14th.—Ox cart with visiting Sovereigns.
- 15th.—Sovereigns on foot.
- 16th.—Log carriage with banjo corps.
- 17th.—Sovereigns on foot.
- 18th.—Ox cart with visitors.
- 19th.—Sovereigns on foot with their dogs, game and axes.
- 20th.—Ox cart with bugler.
- 21st.—Representative Float.

The procession, starting from the Forest, will march up Pollock to Middle street, down Middle to So. Front, down So. Front to Craven, up Craven to Pollock, down Pollock to E. Front, up E. Front to Union, with Union and Johnson to Middle, down Middle to Broad, up Broad to George, down George to Pollock, down Pollock to the Forest, where an adjournment will be had to prepare for the festivities of the evening, to which the public are cordially invited.

The Forest will be opened at 7 o'clock in the evening, with music by the K. of P. Band, after which, the newly elected officers will be introduced, and installed into office by Sov. E. B. Lewis, of Kingston.

3rd Introduction of the Orator by Hon. F. T. Patterson, Mayor of New Bern.

4th Address by Sov. J. E. Hood, Mayor of Goldsboro.

5th Music.

6th Banquet to which all are invited under the soft and melodious strains of the String Band.

7th Toast: "To the Woodmen of the World," by Sov. E. B. Lewis, of Kingston.
