City Ordinances.

By the Board of Aldermen of the City of New Bern:

Be it ordained that Sec. 187 of the ordinances be amended so as to read:

No hog or hogs shall be kept penned or at large in the city limits between May 1st and November 15th. Any person violating this ordinance shall on conviction be fined two dollars for each hog so kept.

By the Board of Aldermen of the City of New Bern:

Be it ordained, that it shall be unlawful for any proprietor of any restaurant, store or other place licensed for the sale of drinks of any kind, to keep for sale or to sell drinks of any kind upon the premises, in any store or room in which there is any screen or other device for privacy, or any store or other room upon the front windows of which there is any paint, curtain or other device of cutting off the view of the interior from passers on the sidewalk or street.

Each sale in each room or store shall be a separate offense and each day that any forbidden window screen, paint or curtain shall be maintained or allowed to remain shall be deemed a separate offense.

A fine of ten dollars shall be imposed for each offense.

TAKE STIMULANTS

Estimated Ninety Percent Men Do In Some Form.

Charter Granted Real Estate Exchange, Cotton Growers Next Meeting. Suit From Presentation of the Clansman.

Treasurer Lacy's Condition.

Delegates to Washington.

Meeting National Guard.

Raleigh, Jan. 5.—A charter was today issued to the Real Estate Exchange and Trust Co., at Durham, with J. S. Carr, J. H. Southgate, E. J. Parish and others as incorporators. Twenty thousand dollars is paid in with a total capitalization of \$100,000. The company will conduct real estate, improvement and insurance business in addition to its named privileges.

A revenue officer makes the very remarkable statement that ninety per cent of the men in this State take stimulants in some form or other, whiskey, peruna, etc. He says the moonshiners have far more friends and supporters than is generally believed among cultivated people and newspaper readers, and that the sheriffs in very few cases will attempt to carry out the Ward law. He says that even the division deputies are not able to enforce the revenue law, and this is why raiders are sent out from the centres to capture the moonshine outfits. The revenue people are naturally much interested in seeing what will be done in enforcing the Ward law, which they say will result in a great increase in the number of illicit distilleries. It is said that distilleries are being captured in this revenue district at the rate of one every other day, say three per week. There are said to be some quite close to Raleigh, and captures have been made near this city.

The King-Crowell Drug Co., of Raleigh, was today chartered to conduct a wholesale and retail business in this city. Incorporators are C. B. Crowell, formerly identified with the drug business in Charlotte, and later proprietor of the Crowell Drug Store here, and Ed C. Birdsong and W. A. King, for many years prominent in drug circles in Raleigh. The company is capitalized at \$20,000.

The news from State Treasurer Lacy today is that his condition is so much improved that it is hoped he will be able to sit up Saturday.

Governor Glenn today appointed the following named delegates to the annual meeting of the Interstate National Guard Association, to be held in Washington, D. C., Jan. 20th: Lt. W. F. Robertson, Wilmington, 2nd infantry; Capt. F. P. Hobgood, Greensboro, 3rd infantry; Capt. High A. Love, Wayneville, 1st infantry; Gen. F. A. Macon, quartermaster general, national guard, Henderson; and Gen. T. R. Robertson, Charlotte.

A regular suit has been instituted against the Raleigh Academy of Music and its manager, Sherwood Upchurch, because of the presentation here of "The Clansman", a week ago tonight, by the Runkel Stock Company, Thomas Dixon bringing the suit. The Runkel company is also embraced in the suit, which is a sweeping one. As your correspondent has stated, the play was presented here as The Clansman, and was written by the stage manager of the company, Mr. Bratton, but the name was to have been changed to "In Re-construction Days." Papers were served today on the persons here, and yesterday on the Company at Durham. This company is to be at Durham all the summer.

The next meeting of the North Carolina Cotton Growers Association will be held here in June or July. The president of the association, C. C. Moore is also the president of the Farmers State Convention which meets here each summer at the Agricultural and Mechanical College.

As an indication that shed have begun to run Mr. W. H. Stillely showed the Journal a fine buck shed caught in net-yesterday morning. It was a large specimen.
