Is World's Meat Producer

Washington, Jan. 8.—No other country produces so great a surplus of meat and no other country, except Ireland, sends so many cattle to the English market as the United States, according to a bulletin issued by the Department of Agriculture today. During the year ended June 30, 1904, the exports of live meat animals and packing-house products were valued at \$217,000,000, while the exports of United States cattle to British ports during that year amounted to \$87,000,000, and along with them were \$36,000,000, and more than 18,000 were exported to Cuba during 1904.

The leading competitor of the United States supplying fresh beef for the British market is Argentina, while Canada said to be about the only competitor in exporting cattle, hams and lard. The bulletin states that the year 1906 will undoubtedly prove a notable one in the tariff history of Europe, important advances having been made by several of those countries.

NOTABLE STUDENT

Mill Superintendent Attends A. & M. College.

Old Court Trial Affairs Again Up. State Charters. 119th Meeting Grand Lodge Masons. Ran Off With Freight Engine. American Forestry Association. Judge Purnell's Court Order.

Raleigh, N. C., Jan. 9.—President Winston of the Agricultural and Mechanical College feels much pride in the fact that J. P. McNeill of Jonesboro, N. C., and superintendent of Clark Manufacturing Co., has registered at the college as a textile student for the special course in design and fancy weaving. He will spend five days in the week at the college, returning one day to the mill for more practical application. This is the first mill superintendent to avail himself of this special course which covers a period of ten weeks.

The trial of Isaac W. Rogers, ex-policeman of Raleigh, is set for Wednesday. The grand jury has not yet returned true bills in the cases of Lilliston and Clark charged with shooting Smith at Union Station. Nor has true bill been returned against Frank Moore and John Burke, for the killing of the watchman at the Standard Oil Company, robbery of its safe and the burning of its plant.

The State charters today the Sowers Distilling Company at Milton, with \$10,000 capital stock; J. W. Sowers, of Milton and other parties of Salisbury are stockholders. The bank of Pender is also chartered at Burgaw with a capital stock of \$25,000 of which \$10,000 is paid in. A. B. Croom, Jr., J. H. Moore and others are incorporators. The bank will conduct a commercial and savings business.

The 119th meeting of the Grand Lodge of Masons will be held here tomorrow, the first session being called to order in the evening. The Grand Custodian, Grand Lecturer and the Grand Master are holding preparatory meetings today. The election of officers will take place Wednesday night. It is expected that more than 600 Masons will be in attendance.

Some party or parties ran a freight engine of the Southern Railway Company from the yards at an early hour yesterday morning, and made the run four miles from the city to a dangerous point just beyond Method, where the engine was abandoned, and left on the block in front of the S. A. L. Palm Limited passenger train. It was seen by the engineer of that train who flagged both ends and saved any fatality. An extra freight train from Greensboro encountered the dead engine and brought it back to Raleigh. The authorities are eagerly on the track of the new-styled thieves.

Governor Glenn has accepted an invitation to be present and to speak at a meeting of the American Forestry Association, which meets at the New Willard Hotel in Washington, the 17th of the month. This speech will be with special reference to the Southern Appalachian Mountain and Forest reserve. A prominent Boston attorney and man of affairs in speaking to your correspondent a few days ago, had much to say as to the benefits to the South in this immediate section, and stated that Mr. Cutler was doing much for its furtherance, having given up other business and so devoting all his time and energies to beneficial measures throughout the country. The Bostonian spoke with assurance as to the will and interest felt by many of the New England National legislators, and is much interested in the stand the South will take in the matter.

Judge Thomas J. Purnell today made an order disallowing attorney's fees, in the matter of E. F. Young, bankrupt, at Dunn, the claim having been for \$300, and the case having occupied more than a year.
