A TOY PISTOL VICTIM.

New Bern now has a case of lockjaw Ireland, a respected negro resident of Lee street, Duffytown, is in a very crit ical condition on account of a wound made on the hand by a toy pistol during the holidays. Lockjaw has set in and it is doubtful if the boy recovers.

Dr. Leinster Duffy was called to at tend the case of the boy on Wednesday and found him in great pain. He suspected that the trouble was due to some injury and noticed symptoms of tetanus but the disease did not develop until yesterday morning and when Dr. Duffy called the case was so pronounce that there was no need to question the malady. The victim suffers terribly and the hardened lines of the face show how tense the muscles are and how firmly the jaws are closed. Tetanic anti-toxin has been administered but at last accounts no results had been n
