NEW SENSATION

The Evidence On Raleigh Murder
Changes Situation.

Supposed Murderer Sentenced to Fourteen
Years but New Testimony Claims Another
Person Than Lilliston Fired the
Shots.—Latest Affidavit, Up-
held Previous Evidence.

Raleigh, January 20.—There came today as the aftermath to the jury's verdict yesterday in the case against Lilliston, the Norfolk, Va., fair fakir, convicted of killing Charles G. Smith, during fair week in Raleigh, and a sentence of fourteen years in the penitentiary, evidence that is entirely new and unheard, which places the matter in the light of a real sensation. Notwithstanding the fact that the case was tried, first in the city court and then in Wake county Superior Court, with a great array of witnesses and the usual reports of that trial by the newspapers there appeared today three other witnesses who made affidavits to the new facts as to the shooting. One woman, who is well known in Raleigh, states she was sitting in the ladies waiting room at the Union Passenger Station on the afternoon the tragedy took place that she was sitting within a few feet of the spot where the man, Smith was shot, and could clearly see the flash of a pistol, her view as she sat not being obstructed by any part of the crowd, and right near the glass partition dividing the men's waiting room from that occupied by ladies. Clark and Lilliston, while the shooting were in another part of the waiting room for men, and that a third party altogether different, and whom she would be able to identify, committed the deed. She also says that eight shots were fired, as she recounted to her friends the next day, though seven was the number accredited. This woman saw the Smith man lean over and press his hands to his side as if in great pain, then saw him sink to a seat from which he was later removed to the ambulance for hospital treatment.

The testimony of the two other witnesses will be virtually the same thing, though their relative positions were not quite so near. Messrs. Argo and Shaffer, and W. N. Holding, counsel for Lilliston, are together going over the matter this afternoon, and there is no doubt that there will be immediate action in the affair that has created such interest in the list of crimes in North Carolina.

In talking with Lilliston's counsel your correspondent was told that there was little doubt now that there was perjury or a case of conspiracy. This view of the matter may be strengthened by the general estimate always placed upon such associates as are usually followers of the fair and such kindred lines of work. The principal witness, the woman here in Raleigh who was in the waiting room, first approached James Lilliston the grief-stricken father of the condemned man, from Norfolk, and told him that she had remained quiescent because she did not desire the prominence that is always given by a court trial, but she had concluded she could not afford to allow an innocent man to suffer, particularly by such a sentence, when a guilty man had committed the murderous deed and had made good his escape. Another witness refrained from speech because he felt a prejudice toward all fair fakirs and men of that class.

This most surprising and unusual turn in the case, after trial, and judgment will come as a distinct surprise to the people who have from day to day followed the testimony and the action of the entire case, which consumed more than a week in Wake county Superior court.

STOCK FOOD SWINDLE.

Wheat, Bran, Etc., Flavored and Scented
And Sold at From \$200 to 2,000
A Ton.

The Raleigh Progressive Farmer sounds a note of warning to the farmers of the South about what it calls the stock food swindle. It says that one of the most outrageous frauds now being perpetrated upon the American farmer is that of prepared stock foods—common meal, bran, etc., with a little cheap sulphur, salt, Epsom salts, pepper, saltpeter, etc., added to change the taste, and the mixture (hardly more valuable than ordinary ship stuff) is put up in flaming packages, advertised in big illustrated ads in farm papers, and sold to gullible farmers at from \$250 to \$2,500 a ton. The Progressive Farmer says further that some time ago, the chief Southern contributor of one of the farm papers most largely circulated in North Carolina and adjoining States, wrote an exposure of the whole miserable fraud and sent it to his paper. The reply came back: "The Blank Stock Food Company pays us \$3,000 a year for advertising, and we would lose it if we were to print your letter. Please don't insist." It is quite proper that while the patent medicine nostrums are getting a drubbing, the stock food should be exposed, and this The Progressive Farmer proposes to do. If the frauds are of the nature complained of, we hope the exposure will be of a nature as to protect the farmer against them.—Charlotte Chronicle.
