RALEIGH

Show Men Indulge in A Scene Not on Program

Oldest Man of Raleigh Slowly Passing Away
Many State Officials Indisposed.

Gov. Glenn Busy With Correspondence.
(Special Correspondence.)

Raleigh, Feb. 12.—Secretary of State Grimes is absent from his office being confined to his room by a severe cold. Hon. S. F. Patterson of the department of agriculture is able to sit up after a confinement to his bed. These two, together with treasurer Lacy, making three of the State officials who have yielded to the changes of the winter.

Governor Glenn is busy in his office with this accumulation of mail for the few days of his absence in the western part of the State. It is quite likely that his report concerning the State Hospital at Morganton will be given to the public Tuesday.

George, the younger son of Col. Fred Olds has been taken by his father to a ranch in west Texas on account illness with lungs, at Waco, Texas.

A trial before justice of the peace between the hours of one and two a. m. was one of the unusual happenings in the city of Raleigh after the Saturday night performance at the Academy of Music, as given to the members of the Fremont Stock Co., a 10, 20, and 30 cent combination playing here throughout the week. Colonel Fremont and one of his specialty men, named York, had a series of word battles concerning the matter of salary, the latter complaining he was unpaid, and the principal holding that he had been given a sufficiency for his service. The argument waxed so warm that a renewal of more than word trouble was the closing scene in the Academy in the presence of several witnesses who had assembled to look at the tawny lion in caged security, after he had done his turn before the footlights. Col. Fremont became strenuous with a stick and struck York. Later in the night, in fact just as the colonel was going aboard the sleeper bound for Asheville, where the company has an engagement this week, he was arrested by a constable and was taken to the rooms of justice Reid, who had been aroused for the trial, with the result that a fine \$5.35 was imposed, and the colonel was allowed to proceed to his sleeper, with just margin enough for an unceremonious exit. York left the company here, and accompanied by his wife. The two men are brothers in law.

Carefully watched and ministered to by a large family and body of extended relatives, William Clinton Upchurch, the oldest citizen of Raleigh and of Wake county, is quietly passing away. Mr. Upchurch will have been 94 years old next Wednesday, Valentine's Day. The venerable man was born in Morrisville, and was married to Miss Adaline Royster, of Raleigh, who died here 12 years ago. Since that time it has been the wish of the bereft old gentleman to continue his residence at the old home on Wilmington street where he had associations with his wife, and there he was watched over and cared for in every sense that love and devotion could dictate. For something more than 50 years Mr. Upchurch has been a most regular morning visitor at the City Market, scarcely ever having been absent, save on Sundays, and he has brought all this stretch of time carried the same market basket, and looked personally after the needs of his household. Some weeks ago he sustained an injury by a fall, since which time he has been steadily failing. Mr. Upchurch was engaged in active business in Raleigh until about 10 years ago, when he retired by reason of advancing age. Mesdames J. C. L. Harris, W. G. Upchurch, F. O. Moring, W. H. Dahl, S. C. Pool, of Raleigh, and Mrs. J. A. Carter, of New York, and J. W. and George Upchurch, of Raleigh, are children. ANOTHER WRECK ON SOUTHERN.

An Act of Negligence Causes a Collision in Which Four Lives are Lost.

Greenboro, Feb. 12.—Sunday morning at 2 o'clock the north bound express No. 34 ran into an open switch at the western end of the yard and collided with a shifting engine and killed outright engineer Will Sellers, fireman Charles Johnson and engineer Charles Norvel of the passenger train, Simpson Freeman conductor of the shifting train was so badly injured that he died two hours later.

None of the passengers were injured and the train was quickly provided with new engine and crew and it resumed its trip not badly delayed. Fire man Sparger of the passenger train was painfully but not seriously wounded.

The blame for the accident is put upon the switchman Turner Welfare and Lawrence Malcolm. They have disappeared and the police have not been able to locate them. A warrant for their arrest was sworn out Sunday afternoon for them. The wrecked engines were brought to the depot yard and large crowds visited the scene of the fearful accident.

The resignation of Mr. Hahn as fence commissioner of the 8th township was presented on motion was accepted.

On motion Mr. R. L. Thornton was appointed fence commissioner of 8th township to fill the vacancy caused by Mr. Hahn's resignation.

Mr. R. A. Nunn appeared before the Board in the interest of the Board of Education and requested that the Board of Commissioners have a map of the county made.

On motion commissioners Foy and Wadsworth were appointed a committee to confer with the Board of Education in reference to said map and report at the next meeting.

Ordered by the Board that Sarah Capps be allowed to pay all back taxes upon property listed to her which property has been sold for taxation.
