## ILLCIT SEIZURES

Of Fine Still and 2,500 Gallons Beer.

Ring Necked Pheasant & Curlews. Old Carrolton Hotel Torn Down for Better Building. Charter Bank at LaGrange Doctor Hines' Condition. (Special Correspondence.)

Raleigh, March 5.—One of the handsomest specimens of the ring necked pheasant has just been taxidermied and returned to its owner in Pittsboro, where the bird was shot and killed by a negro man to whom it was a curiosity. So far three birds of this species have been killed in and about Pittsboro, as well as several fine specimens of horned owls of unusual dimensions.

Insurance Commissioner Young, has notified the Order of Good Samaritans and the Sisters of Samaria, another of the negro benefit associations in the State that all claims and details of the old business must be settled when they will be permitted either to join with the licensed branch in North Carolina or the original body established some years ago in Washington, D. C. The chief officer in the State is A. R. Middleton, of Kenaville.

Deputy Revenue Collectors D. C. Downing and K. W. Merritt have this time made a capture of the "Parts Illicit" that outdo anything of the kind ever undertaken and accomplished in the Eastern district. This last accomplishment was the surrendering of an outfit comprising a fine still of 175 gallons capacity, the copper of which was so heavy that even a pick could not be forced through the metal, two worms, one cap, with a full and up-to-date apparatus of hester tubs and doublers, and 19 fermenters with a capacity of 3,000 gallons, 2,500 gallons of beer in the process of fermentation, and the general appearance of having seen real and actual service and for a considerable period of time. Such an establishment meant the production of 60 gallons of the real stuff per day. The scene of this latest raid was within 2 1/2 miles and to the east of Hackney's Small village in Chatham county. It was something more than half a mile from any road and the officers are at a loss to understand how the journey could have been made to place the apparatus. The find was the question of vigilance and following the course of a creek.

The old Carrolton hotel on Fayetteville street, at the corner of Cabarrus street, is to be torn down at once. The Park Avenue Land company, which was granted a charter a few days ago, with \$25,000 capital, will bring about the establishment of a beautiful suburban property, land having purchased fronting on Park Avenue in West Raleigh and overlooking Pullen Park and the campus of the A. & M. College. About 35 lots will thus be available for residential purposes.

**Capitalists go to Beaufort.**  
Saturday a special train containing a party of the members of the delegation from Rhode Island who were in Raleigh to deliver the Confederate battle flag went to Morehead City and from there they went to Beaufort. In the party were Chief Justice Douglas, of Rhode Island who was present marshal at Beaufort during the war, Marston J. Perry, president of the Union Trust Co., Providence, R. I., and president of the A. & N. C. Co.; J. E. Stucky's banker, A. H. Watson, a manufacturer and George I. Shapley, a capitalist all of Rhode Island and a number of the officials of the Norfolk and Southern and Atlantic and North Carolina rail way companies.

They were much interested in the improvements contemplated and those in progress at Beaufort and expressed great hope for the little city by the sea.

## JUVENILE COURTS.

Where Youthful Offenders Got Separate Trials According to Crimes Committed.

Washington, D. C., Feb 6.—An effort is being made in Washington as in several other cities to introduce the Juvenile Court by which youthful offenders will be granted separate trials and accorded punishment according to their age and their experience in crime. The experiment has been so thoroughly tested in New York, Chicago, St. Louis and notably in Denver, where Judge Ben Lindsey presides over this tribunal that it is conceded to be a necessary part of the Government of all large cities. Seven years ago there was not a juvenile court in the country but they are now regarded as the only effective and humane way of treating youthful offenders and as one of the most important judicial reforms of the century. They are founded on the presumption that the child delinquent is not a criminal and that he shall not be treated as a criminal and, its object is to reclaim each child brought before it to useful citizenship. The idea of punishment is eliminated as far as possible and the commitment to reform schools is the last resort. The bill to establish such a court in the District of Columbia is now before Congress and has already passed the Senate.

## MORE INSANITY SHOWN

In Matthews Case. Examination Supt. McKeen of Raleigh Shows Strong Pro-Defence. Testimony Monday Favors Defendant's Insanity.

Greensboro, March 5.—Superintendent Jas McKee of the Insane Asylum at Raleigh, examined today by defence in Matthews murder trial, occupied almost the entire afternoon. In answer to hypothetical question which took an hour and half to propound, he said on such a state of facts he should pronounce the family of prisoner a block of neurotics, of highly nervous people made up of epileptics, idiots, imbeciles and lunatics and if facts related in question of prisoner's acts on day of wife's death were true, he was unquestionably insane. In reply to another hypothetical interrogatory, the witness gave the opinion that prisoner had been insane for more than twelve months preceding wife's death. On cross examination Solicitor Brooks put a hypothetical question based on acts, detailed as having been committed by prisoner on day of wife's death, in their presence and received for answer, that if these facts were true, the prisoner was unquestionably insane. Solicitor Brooks abruptly told witness to stand aside, and court adjourned.

At the morning session several domestics who had worked at the Matthews home the past two years, testified that the two were invariably courteous and affectionate to each other. Policeman Pugh testified that he witnessed their greeting when Matthews returned from Durham, the night before his death, and their manner was so affectionate it attracted the bystanders attention and both were plainly "doped."

## BALANCE OF STOCK SOLD

The Elks Temple Project Has Received a New Impetus to Action

Saturday a deal was transacted between the treasurer of the Elks Building Fund and Mr. James B. The building and site will cost \$50,000.

## Simpson Plant Destroyed

The large turpentine distilling plant of the Simpson Manufacturing Co. located near Riverdale was destroyed by fire early Sunday morning. The plant was for the manufacture of turpentine and kindred products of pine, but had been in operation but a short time but was enjoying an excellent business the plant being worked to its great capacity.

Mr. C. W. Bilfinger was manager and through his energy the plant was equipped, the most approved machinery and methods. The loss is stated to be between \$8,000 and \$10,000 no insurance.

The origin of the fire is unknown. The manager stated that at 12 o'clock Saturday night a thorough examination of the premises was made and there was no sign of any fire or smoke. Two hours later the entire plant was a mass of flames and was very quickly destroyed. He will build again and proceed on the same lines that adopted with the first plant.
