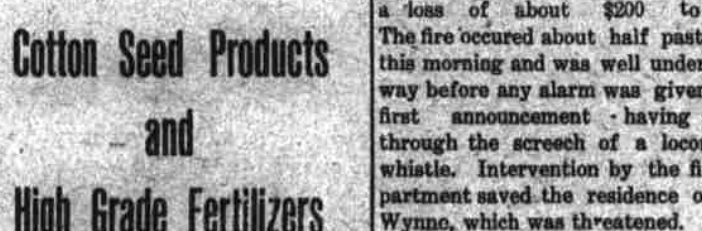

New Lumber Concern, Phases in Hotel Rooms. Festival Orchestra. Gives Up Insurance for Law
(Special Correspondence.)
Greensboro, March 9.—Shaw and McMath is the name of the new lumber concern, organized in this city last night. J. T. B. Shaw, formerly secretary and treasurer of the Greensboro Lumber Company and O. L. McMath, an experienced lumber dealer, from Onley, Va., are the proprietors. They will do a wholesale and retail business and their plant will be located on the John A. Hodgkin lot, near the Greensboro Lumber Company. The new firm starts out business with a capital of \$5,000.

The Bell Telephone Company has just installed a private branch exchange in the Hotel Guilford. Telephones have been put in sixty rooms of the hotel and guests will not be able to use both local and long distance phones from their rooms. A similar plant is now being installed in the Benbow. In this building 115 rooms will be connected.

Murderer Matthews Found Guilty of Murder
In Second Degree.
Special to Journal.
Greensboro, March 9.—The famous murder case of Dr. Matthews was ended this morning when the jury came in and announced the verdict of guilty of murder in the second degree. The counsel for defense made a motion for a new trial which was over ruled by Judge Ferguson. Motion for arrest of judgment was then made which was also denied.

The counsel for the defense stated that had a verdict of not guilty been rendered Matthews would have been committed to a sanitarium, stating that the logical place for such as he would be where he could receive scientific treatment, not ordinarily given in State prisons, even under these circumstances.

Judge Bynum acting for Solicitor Brooks, prayed judgment at which request Judge Ferguson sentenced Matthews to twenty years of hard labor in the penitentiary. The prisoner did not show any emotion either when the result of the jury was announced or when the judge passed sentence.

An appeal was taken from the judgment and thirty days were allowed for perfecting the same.

Promoted to Special Gauger
Raleigh, March 9.—W. A. Stancill has been promoted from the position of store keeper and gauger to that of special gauger, effective today. It is not yet known whether this work will be through the Raleigh, or Greensboro office. J. J. Penny of Wake county succeeds Mr. Stancill.

The house on Queen street near St. Peters church, occupied by a colored family caught on fire from a defective chimney yesterday. The fire was easily put out and the damage was light.

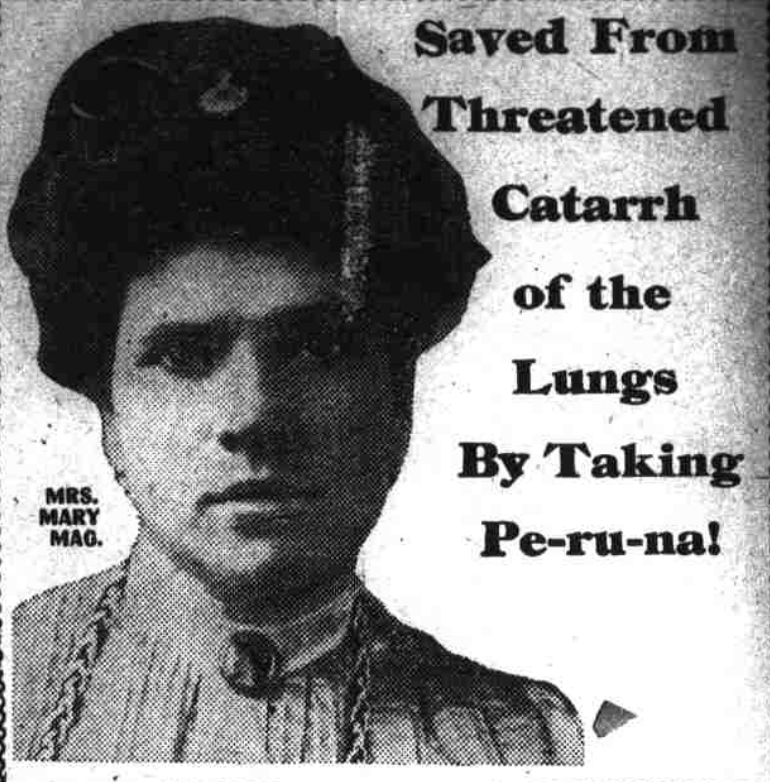
