THE GATE CITY

Late Happenings From This Active Metropolis

Free Land Site for Manufactory. Elks Auditorium. Specter Resigns. Phone Service Over Southern. No Federal Court. Dates for Circuit Court of Officials.

(Special Correspondence.)

Greensboro, March 15.—Mr. Garland Daniel, a large property owner here and one of Greensboro's most enterprising and public spirited citizens, has offered to deed areas of valuable land adjoining the city and on the railroad, free of charge as sites for manufacturing concerns.

For some time a committee of the Lodge of Elks has been quietly maturing plans for the erection of a large lodge auditorium, lodge and office building. Recently all the lodges and fraternal societies in the city have conceived the idea of co-operation for the purpose of erecting a grand "Union Temple" or "Fraternity Home," having lodge rooms and auditoriums for every lodge in the city, with a general club room apartments. While this scheme is in embryo committees from all the organizations are being formed and the suggestion has been found a most popular one.

The vestry of St. Barnabas' Episcopal church on Monday received a letter from Rev. H. Baldwin Dean tendering his resignation as rector of the church. Failing health causes Dr. Dean to resign. He wrote that he wanted to come back and resign in person but the state of his health was such that he could not.

The Southern Railway has just completed the work of installing a telephone service in every station of the Danville division. The wires used for telegraphing are used for the telephones. The use of telephones it is thought will considerably facilitate the carrying on of the company's business. It is often possible to telegraph over a wire when telegraphing over it is impossible.

There was no session of the Federal Court yesterday morning. It was expected yesterday that B. F. Sprinkle of Raleigh, would be present and the formal proceedings of entering the mandate of the circuit of Appeals approving Judge Boyd's sentence two years ago of the defendant to the penitentiary at Atlanta would be had. Last night by agreement, it was arranged for Sprinkle to appear Friday and to submit himself to the judgment of the court.

An order was received from Circuit Judge Nathan Goff this morning to the effect that a regular term of Circuit Court of Appeals would begin in Richmond the first week in May, for hearing appeals from Maryland, Eastern Virginia, and West Virginia. On May 21st, the court will begin its session in Asheville to hear cases from South Carolina, the Eastern and Western Districts of North Carolina and the Western District of Virginia.

An inadvertent injustice was done some of the defendants indicted in the Federal Court here for alleged frauds against the government, by the statement in the correspondence yesterday that John W. Hast, was present while many were not. It is learned this morning that every one of the defendants represented by Messrs Adams, Flynn, McVail, Aycock, Hand, Watson, to-wit: Officers Harty, Samuel, Hardin, Smith and Walker were on hand, ready to know the order of the court. Their absence from the bar, and the statement by Judge Boyd that it would be useless to try Hast, had have to try others over again, gave rise to the impression that he alone was present.

Mrs. T. C. Cozart, secretary of the Women's Christian Temperance Union in North Carolina, addressed the students at the Normal and Industrial College at 4:30 o'clock yesterday afternoon. The address was made under the auspices of the Young Women's Christian Association of that institution and was largely attended and enjoyed by the student body.

Such is Total Grand Tax of the State.

Memorial Building for St. Mary's. Auditor Dinec Wants Cession of Blackburn and Holton News From Washington. Additional State Charters Granted.

(Special Correspondence.)

Raleigh, N. C., March 15.—The State chartered the Cape Fear Dairy Co., at Duke, in Harnett county, with an authorized capital stock of \$5,000, which may be increased to \$25,000. E. S. Yarbrough, G. J. Smith and A. Y. Kelly, of Duke, are incorporators. Poultry, eggs and cheese will also be handled.

The recapitulation of the report of the State Auditor of North Carolina which is now in the hands of the State printers, shows some interesting figures as to the taxes of the State, as follows:

Real estate and personal property \$746,831.99; Income \$24,689.19; Schedule B, \$128,653.40; Schedule C, \$29,885.67; Total general taxes \$929,459.29; Pension, property and poll \$175,326.66; State general and special \$1,104,785.95; School taxes payable to county treasurers \$1,278,689.65; County taxes \$2,078,094.03, or a grand total of \$4,461,569.63.

The Planters' Warehouse Company at Apex, will do a general tobacco business, will manufacture and sell plug and smoking tobacco, cigars and cigarettes; and will also make boxes, cases etc. The capital stock is placed at \$300,000, of which amount \$1,500 has been subscribed. Incorporators are W. B. Johnson, Raleigh, L. S. and F. J. Olive, S. W. Stone, H. W. Harward, B. B. Wagner and C. W. Mills, of Apex. The establishment of this plant at Apex will also mean more business of a similar kind in that section.

C. C. Hook of the architectural firm of Hook & Rodgers, of Charlotte, spent today in Raleigh, where he was called to look after the awarding of contracts for the erection of the Memorial auditorium at St. Mary's School here. Bids were not opened today because of the absence of Bishop Cheever, who will return next week.

"Will you not ask the papers of the State of North Carolina to request their correspondents in Washington, D. C., to let up on Blackburn and Bolton, and to spend some of their time in interviewing the senators and representatives from North Carolina, at least part of the time. Holton and Blackburn seem to have become a sort of continuous performance with them?" This comment was offered by Dr. B. F. Dixon, State Auditor, and he was in earnest in the request.

GRAVEN'S EDUCATIONAL PROGRESS.

County Superintendent Grison's Report On Schools and Their Development.

In an interview with Supt. S. M. Brinson, who has nearly completed his school visiting in Craven county for this winter, the Journal has learned some most satisfactory news, as to the educational situation in this county, outside of this city, as well as regarding some matters in this city.

Mr. Brinson has visited schools in every township, not every school, but 57 in all, and while most of the schools are about over for the term, there are a few still in session. The outlook in all townships is favorable and everything is encouraging, and particularly in the way of better school houses and new school houses, is the prospect bright. At Fort Barnwell there is to be a new school building to cost \$1,200, and at Cove where there has been a consolidation of two school districts, also a \$1,200 building. Vanceboro is to have a new building, which is to be erected under the enterprise of a local stock company of citizens, who organized after the special tax election failed, determined to have a new school building. At Bachelor and Croatan it is expected that new school houses will be erected.

This county has taken up its full allowance for rural free libraries, and has applied for more.

In the matter of the colored school in this city, which lost its building by fire, Supt. Brinson, had no encouraging report to make, as the funds so far secured were insufficient to start the erection of a new school building at present.

Coins Trick Explained.

A magician will sometimes borrow a dime and mark it before you and seem to put the same in the middle of a handkerchief and wind it that you may better see and feel it; then he will take the handkerchief and bid you feel whether the dime be there or not, and he will also require you to put the same under a candlestick or some such like thing; then he will send for a basin of water, and holding the basin under the table right against the candlestick he will use certain words of enchantment, and in a short time you will hear the dime fall into the basin. Of the native he says: "He will go to work for a few weeks or months and earn a few pounds, then returns to his home and leads the life of a gentleman. He is able to purchase with the tobacco the best of food and luxuries and leads a most happy and successful life. While tobacco remains the currency, as it is now, I see no hope of improvement in the labor conditions with the native."

Scuttled by Muskets.

The steamer Swan sunk at her pier here as a result of a leak caused by muskets. The rodents gnawed a hole through the hull near the water line, and the boat scuttled until she rested on the bottom.
