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### J. E. Latham & Co's Weekly Cotton Letter.

Special to Journal.

Greensboro, March 24—The final spinners report was made public on Tuesday, and the first impulse of the public was to regard it as bearish, and the market in a few moments lost about 40 points. May selling as low as 1033. A careful study of the report however shows it to be bullish, and the available high grades will all be needed before supplies can be received from the new crop. The weather has been less favorable, and this has helped along the boll movement, although the gain in the new crop positions is considerably less than in the present crop. The spinners in all foreign countries except Russia, are doing a fine business, but in America there is a marked tendency to go slow in buying, both jobbers of goods and converters of yarns. The spinners, however, keep busy, and there is no talk of short time or curtailment. Under such circumstances it is difficult to see a good reason for any important decline. May closes at 11.15 which is 56 points higher than a week ago.

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### RACE WAR THREATENED

Chattanooga People Fear Action of Supreme Court in Matter of Negro Lynching.

Washington, March 23.—The situation at Chattanooga growing out of the lynching of the negro Johnson by a mob Monday night a few hours after the United States Supreme Court had granted a stay of execution of the death sentence passed by a State court assumed a serious aspect today, when telegrams were received by President Roosevelt, members of the Supreme Court and Attorney-General Moody from a number of the most prominent and conservative citizens of Chattanooga asking that the Government leave the situation to Chattanooga for the local authorities to deal with, explaining that for the Federal authorities to take a hand in the matter at this time would, in view of the present disturbed condition, result in nothing short of a grave race war. The messages were carefully considered at the Cabinet meeting today, and while the force of the argument was appreciated by the President and his official advisers, nothing could be determined until the Supreme Court justices could be consulted. It is the Supreme Court that is most concerned in the matter, as it was the affront to the dignity and prestige of that body that brought about the present state of affairs.

### New Bern's Position on the Map

Inquiry of the captain of the U. S. Revenue Cutter "Boutwell" as the latitude and longitude of New Bern develops the fact that the spire of Christ church is the point established by the U. S. Coast and Geodetic Survey. To be exact, the latitude of the church spire is 35 degrees, 6 minutes, 25 seconds North; 77 degrees 2 minutes and 22 seconds West, (of Greenwich, England.) The difference in time between New Bern and the Greenwich observatory is 5 hours 8 minutes, 8 seconds and 19 one-hundredths. When the 11 o'clock service begins today at Christ Church, (presuming that it does so on time) the clocks at Greenwich should indicate about 8 minutes past four in the afternoon.

Mr. Warren's fountain is made in mahogany and Italian marble, the rich warm color of the wood together with the high polish make it worthy of more than passing remark. It stands ten feet high and eleven feet long. A notable part is an elegant plate glass mirror in the upright which measures 6 x 9 feet. The shelves and counters are of Italian marble which not only complies with the artistic ideas of the manufacturer but is a wholesome and cleanly arrangement. The two ice cream cabinets are made of marble and are moveable. There are twelve syrup jars which are supplied with latest improved pump operated by pressing down on a glass knob. The equipment is perfect for all things connected with concerns of this kind. A convenient place is arranged for keeping milk or cream chilled and a place is made in the counter for three cut glass jars for holding fruit. All metal parts are beautifully silver plated except three brass ornaments on the upright. Conveniences are made for hot as well as for cold drinks. A chute for disposing of waste matter keeps the place clean and brightly.

Mr. Warren will make his own syrups and ice cream. He has had extensive experience in making extracts and soda fountain syrups and we may be assured of the purity and genuineness of the article desired. A pleasant feature in the store is the furnishing with tables and chairs especially those of children's sizes. The latter are as serviceable as they are pretty and completes his summer drink bazaar in all the essentials of such a place.
