THE BLACKBURN TRIAL

This All Important Matter This Week

Able Lawyers for Defense. Statutes Under Which Indictments Were Made. Matthews, Wife Slayer Gives Bond and Goes to Sanitorium.

(Special Correspondence.)
Greensboro, April 17.—Mr. and Mrs. B. W. Matthews of Durham, N. C., father and mother of Dr. J. B. Matthews, came up from Durham yesterday and gave the bond of \$5,000 for his appearance at the next term of criminal court to be held for this country. It is not probable that the appeal in the case will be heard by the Supreme court until the October term and the bond will be renewed from time to time until the appeal is disposed of. It will be recalled that Dr. Matthews was convicted of second degree murder and sentenced to twenty years in the penitentiary. At first it was thought that Dr. Matthews' people that he should remain in the county jail where he could, with the treatment of the county physician and by means of confinement be unable to get the drug, be broken of his habit of taking morphine. On account of his health, however, they decided that it would be best now to give the bond and send him to some sanitorium, and he will be immediately sent to Mount Hope Sanitorium near Baltimore, Md., where he will take a course of treatment for the morphine habit, hoping that he may be permanently cured. His brother-in-law, J. N. Gorman left with Dr. Matthews for Richmond, Va., to spend a short while with his sister, Mrs. J. N. Gorman before taking him to the sanitorium.

Judge Boyd left Sunday night to hold the April term of Federal court at Statesville. It will require every office deputy the marshal has to run the two courts in session at Statesville and Greensboro at the same time. The United States Circuit Court, Judge Goff presiding for the trial of Congress man Blackburn will open tomorrow. There were many signs of the approaching trial of the Congressman visible last night to the casual observer. Judge Goff, District Attorney Lewis, U. S. Internal Revenue Collector Yerkes, Collectors Duncan and Hookins arrived. Special Assistant District Attorney J. J. Britt, who will aid in the prosecution arrived early in the morning from Asheville, and District Attorney Holtzman reached here from Winston at noon. It is highly probable that first Assistant Attorney General Robb, will reach here from Washington during the day. A new attorney appearing for the defense is Capt. S. F. Lovell, of Boone. He arrived Saturday night. Congressman Blackburn is a native of Watauga county and Capt. Lovell, who is one of the ablest lawyers and best citizens of that section, is here to defend Watauga's son. Capt. Lovell, was the democratic candidate for congress from that District against Linney, the last time the District was represented by a republican before Blackburn's first election to congress. Rumors to the effect that ex-Congressman Thomas Settle, who has been here two weeks or more, was retained to appear for Blackburn were not verified today when one of the attorneys for Blackburn said that his attorneys were ex-Judge W. F. Bynum, G. S. Bradshaw, E. J. Justice, A. L. Hymas, and Capt. F. F. Lovell. It is understood that the main fight will be over the construction of the statute under which Blackburn is indicted. The contention it is said will be that Blackburn at the time of the alleged acceptance of a fee was not an officer of the government, the construction placed on it, in these cases to the contrary notwithstanding. The statute under which he is indicted is as follows, and the Revised Statutes is designated as:

Section 1782. No senator, representative, or delegate, after his election and during his continuance in office, and no head of a department or other officer or clerk in the employ of the government, shall receive or agree to receive any compensation whatever, directly or indirectly, for any services rendered, or to be rendered, in any person, either by himself or another, in relation to any proceeding, contract, claim, controversy, charge, accusation, arrest, or other matter or thing in which the United States is a party, or directly or indirectly interested, before any department, court, martial, bureau, office, or any civil, military, or naval commission whatever.

Every person offending against this section shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and shall be imprisoned not more than two years, and fined not more than ten thousand dollars, and shall moreover, by conviction therefor, be rendered forever hereafter incapable of holding any office of honor, trust or profit under the Government of the United States.

FERTILIZER DEMAND.

Farmers Still Holding Their Cotton Back.

Removing Old War Landmarks. State Treasurer Lacy. Summer School Prospects. Cadets of A. & M. College Act Disorderly. Special Correspondence.

Raleigh, N. C., April 17.—The manager of the Summer School for teachers announces that Miss Celieta Parrish, who is professor of pedagogy and director of the practice school at the Georgia State Normal College at Athens, will attend the great meeting of the Assembly in June.

The demand for commercial fertilizers continue quite heavy and so does that upon the agricultural department for tax tags. Much cotton continues to be held in this section and the farmers do not seem to show much disposition to turn loose, though the figures are high. A powerful steam shovel is cutting away embankments so as to give a large increase of trackage in the yards of the Seaboard Air Line Railway here. One of the sections removed was marked by a battery of four pins, which was part of the circle of encroachments built in 1863 to protect Raleigh in an attack by Federal troops who, it was expected would make a dash upon the capital from New Bern where General Foster was in command. Large numbers of slaves were requisitioned to do this work. There are eleven batteries along the entrenched lines of these three remains, the others having been removed either in railway or agricultural work. The two magazines have also been destroyed. One of the remaining batteries is near the soldiers' home, and certainly ought to be retained as an object of interest in future years. It may not be known generally, but it is said to be a fact that at one time it was a plan of General Joseph E. Johnston in his retreat before General Sherman to make a stand here at Raleigh.

State Treasurer Lacy was looked for last Saturday but will not reach here before the end of this week. He left Arizona yesterday. A letter from Mr. Stephen B. Weeks who is now in charge of an Indian school in Arizona says he met Treasurer Lacy there recently. Mr. Weeks has until the last year or so been at Santa Fe, New Mexico.

Unless the authorities of the Agricultural and Mechanical College make a thorough investigation as to the behavior of some of the cadets at the ball game with Trinity yesterday, Governor Glenn will himself start an examination of the affair. A full dog belong to a cadet seized a Trinity chicken and some cadets and their town friends seized the fowl. In an attempt to save the bird, made by Trinity people, the chicken was killed, and then the cadets repeatedly threw the body of the fowl into the air, pulled out the feathers and put these in their hats. One cadet used oaths near carriage full of ladies, whereupon another cadet attacked him and there was a heavy fight in which others were drawn. Later the light was renewed in rear of the grandstand. Comments on the affair was very sharp and the lauders are very plain in their statements as to the behavior.

DISCUSS NEW CARTAGE RATES
Mass Meeting Held in City Hall With a View to Modifying Car Shipping Law.

A number of citizens met in the city hall last night to the call of the Merchants Association to devise some means to adjust the differences between the city and the railroad or to modify the law now in force as to the shifting of cars on Hancock street. The action of the drymen in raising the price of cartage from ten to twenty cents was the cause of the meeting and it was the view expressed by many that the condition now existing is very unsatisfactory.

Mr. J. A. Meadows presided over the meeting and Mr. T. G. Hyman was secretary. The matter was presented by Mr. D. E. Henderson in some brief remarks. A discussion of the matter was taken up but no plan was adopted toward the solving of the difficulty. A proposition will doubtless be submitted within a few days which, it is believed will relieve the situation considerably.

New Bern Wins Second Game

The second game was played with Kinston yesterday and while the visitors gave evidence of familiarity and practice with the game they were hardly in the class with the New Bern sluggers. In the third inning the visitors "found the ball" and for a time it looked as if they had mastered the situation, but however was but for the time as all the rest of the game their play was decidedly off color. The game at least was interesting. The score was 18 to 11.

To Consolidate This Year. Corporation Commission and Goldboro Depot Site. Special to Journal.

Raleigh, April 17.—Today there was conference of president J. Y. Joyner of North Carolina Teachers Assembly, Chas. J. Parker its secretary and R. D. W. Connor in charge of summer school for teachers. The assembly and summer schools will be consolidated this year. Secretary Parker expects 2,000 teachers. The corporation commission fixes April 25th for hearing on location of union passenger station at Goldboro. The railways and people agree the station is a necessity, the only question is where it shall stand.
