HIGHWAY ROBBERY.

Charged Against Negroes Who Resist Arrest.

Commencement Program & F. C. Lassie Lay Getting On Train. Phosphate Cider Drunkenness. Daughters Confederacy Memorial Day.

Greensboro, May 5.—On complaint of a negro railroad track walker, Charles Donnell, that Tom Whitfield, Charles Cecil and Will Stewart, colored, had waylaid and robbed him a few miles north of here, officers yesterday afternoon arrested the three men and they are now in jail charged with highway robbery. Donnell said Stewart held a pistol at his head, while the others took his watch and all his money. The officers secured a hand car and overtook the men near Brown Summit. Being ordered to surrender, the man named Stewart drew a pistol and it snapped. He then jumped in the bushes and ran, the officers firing at him. He was struck in the left elbow, in the right arm and in the leg, and surrendered, being hand-cuffed and brought to jail with the other men. The wound in his left elbow is thought to be serious and physicians are attending him at the jail. The men claim that Donnell was sitting on the road gambling with them and losing his watch and money made the trouble.

Charlie Earl, the 12 year old son of Mr. and Mrs. W. M. Earl, who lives on Gregory street, had his left foot so badly mangled by being run over by a freight train yesterday afternoon about six o'clock that amputation was necessary. The leg was amputated just below the knee last night. According to information obtained, Charlie attempted to board a moving freight train at Spring street crossing and in so doing lost his balance and fell, the wheels running over his left foot, crushing it into a jelly.

Samples of the phosphate cider which is on sale at a number of stores here has been analyzed by Prof. J. H. Bradford, of the A. and M. College, and he found that it contained 12.3 per cent alcohol. He said that the cider was evidently made from fruit juice and corn whisky. On the strength of the testimony given by a defendant in the mayor's court a few days ago to the effect that the cider would produce drunkenness, Chief Needley procured samples and had it analyzed with the result as above stated.

The total resources are \$43,890,000, capital stock paid in, \$6,086,800; surplus funds, \$1,150,415; deposits subject to check \$26,496,969.

THE ROAD TO WASHINGTON

Not a Speculative Dream, But a Project Sure to Go.

The Norfolk Virginian-Pilot of May 3, published the following interesting news on the railroad prospects and all things indicate that these statements will be made good. It is not many weeks since a party of surveyors were at work on the north side of Neuse river, of whom it was said that they were laying a route for the road to Washington. The accompanying story gives some color to the report. The only question of doubt in regard to this article is that the road will be completed within a year, unless actual work is commenced at once.

"By May 1, 1907, in time for the opening of the Jamestown exposition, the Greater Norfolk and Southern railway expects to carry passengers over its through line from Raleigh to Norfolk. F. S. Gannon, the newly elected president of the consolidated Norfolk and Southern and Virginia-Carolina Coast railways, made this announcement yesterday after returning from an inspection trip over his railway and branch lines.

Mr. Gannon stated yesterday that his trip south had for its object to complete the line from New Bern to Washington, N. C., and further declared if the steel market is in the condition that rails may be had he hoped to have a direct line from Norfolk to Raleigh in operation within a year.

The completion of the line from Norfolk to New Bern, of which the construction of the five-and-a-half mile bridge across Albermarle sound is a part, will be an immense benefit to Norfolk. Mr. Gannon says then trains can be run from New Bern in the morning so that shoppers from eastern North Carolina may spend a half day in Norfolk and return to their homes in the evening. Under the present conditions the entire day is consumed in the trip one way, while under the proposed new conditions the round-trip can be made in a day-and several hours spent in Norfolk.

By the completion of this line Washington, Plymouth, Morehead City and Beaufort will also be brought in close touch with Norfolk.

At the present time thirty-three miles of track from Washington to Raleigh have been laid.

Unofficial reports have it that the Norfolk and Southern railway will not stop at Raleigh. In lumber circles it is believed the line will be extended on to the western part or North Carolina and thence into the lumber districts of Georgia.
