WIRELETS FROM WASHINGTON.

Records of Some of the Transactions of Congress. Senator Gorman in Serious Condition of Health, A Menstruous Battlehip. Special to Journal.

Washington, May 9th.—The Elkins amendment to the rate bill which provides that inter-state roads cannot engage in the production of coal and other commodities passed the Senate today. The upper house has about finished the discussion of the bill and it is expected a vote will be taken soon.

Senator Gorman, of Maryland, is critically ill at his home, suffering with a complication of diseases. The attending physician gives no promise of recovery.

Congressman Houston, of Tennessee, presented a resolution in the house today demanding an investigation of the Agricultural department.

William Nelson Cromwell who is chief counsel for the Panam railway defied the request made by Senator Gorman for demanding an explanation of the letter Cromwell wrote the late Secretary Hay and declared that Congress has no power to remove direction of the company.

Chief of the Bureau of Naval Construction announces that a monster 20,000 ton battleship will be built for the navy if the makers be given four years to complete the work. The only place it can be made is at New York. The cost will exceed \$10,000,000.

Dedication of M. E. Church South, at Tuttle's Grove.

Wire Grass, May 7.
On the morning of the 29th of April, 1906, the talented consecrated Rev. D. H. Tuttle, of Fayetteville, N. C., preached at the M. E. Church, Tuttle's Grove, for the first time since the foundation of the church. Long before the appointed hour the building was seated to the utmost capacity and many who could not obtain seats inside were seated upon buggies and carriages at the windows and doors. At eleven he preached a fine intellectual frame work sermon. It was filled with earnest spirituality, after which the small amount necessary to clear the church of its indebtedness, was quickly and easily raised.

At 1:30 luncheon was served on the grounds, after which friends and acquaintance exchanged greetings with one another until 2:30 when the peals of music rendered by Miss Edyth Kennedy of Newport, brought every one in the church that could obtain seats. Then followed the dedicational sermon and exercise. The church was dedicated to God in the name of M. E. Church Tuttle, Grove, Rev. D. H. Tuttle with his enthusiastic voice again held the audience in perfect silence, his discourse was clear and forcible. Never was a larger gathering present at the dedication of a country church. The number estimated were between 1,000 and 1,200.

May God's richest blessing rest upon the church and may it ever prove worthy of the name it bears.

OVER HALF MILLION SHAD

From Government Fish Hatchery Planted in Neuse River.

Mr. G. J. N. Ives received from the government fish hatchery at Edenton, a consignment of 704,000 young shad, for planting in the Neuse. It came on the steamer Albemarle and was received by Mr. Copeland the distinguished agent, who at once put them in Mr. Ives's care. They were transported on the naphtha launch Lucia to the narrows several miles above New Bern and deposited in the river by Mr. Hellen Huff.

Owing to a delay in the Atlantic Coast Line train a few days ago a shipment of fish marked for New Bern were carried on to Wilmington and planted there. The fish received here yesterday were originally meant for the Wilmington waters but the shipments were exchanged.

There has not been any shad planted for two years and it is believed that this consignment will stock the river with plenty of fine shad. It is hoped that a second planting may be secured before long. Mr. Ives is to be heartily commended for his energy in getting this large supply of fish.
