Commander of Port of St. Petersburg Assassinated by Workman. Another Crisis in Russia.

St. Petersburg, May 14.—There is a fresh crisis in affairs, and it is felt the Czar must give amnesty to settle the impending trouble.

Vice Admiral Kuzrich, commanding the port of St. Petersburg, was stabbed in the back with a dagger by a workman, and instantly killed. The workmen in the arsenal desired to march out in a body and celebrate May day. Permission was refused by Kuzrich. He was cruel to all and generally hated. The man who wounded him had the dagger concealed in a hollow cane.

CARL SCHURZ DEAD

Mrs. Davis Improves. Lawyer Hummel Can not Escape Trial For Perjury.

New York, May 14.—Carl Schurz, prominent for half a century, died today, aged 76 years. After the civil war he stood prominent in maintaining that no coercive measure against the Southern States be used. He was a brigadier general in the United States army, retired, ex-Minister to Spain, had been a United States Senator from Missouri, was Secretary of the Interior in President Hayes cabinet, and was editor of the New York Evening Post.

The improvement in the condition of Mrs. Jefferson Davis continues. Abraham Hummel, the noted criminal lawyer, must stand for trial for perjury, in a recent case for which he was convicted.

IN WASHINGTON

President Roosevelt Will Not Reply Directly to Tillman. Cotton Futures and Rate Bill Discussions.

Washington, May 14.—A bill was introduced today by representative Heflin of Alabama to make keeping a place for dealing in cotton futures, a gambling place, and the penalty for such a fine of not less than \$5,000 and a year's imprisonment.

The President will personally make no reply to Senator Tillman. The reply will come in some other way. The rate bill was discussed in the Senate today. A new amendment was tabled which provided that investigations be made by the commission, to find the value of the property of every railroad.

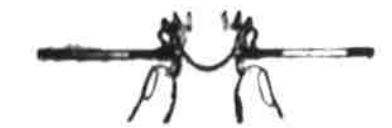
