General Weather Summary of Week

June 18. There has been but very little sunshine during the past week. The weather was generally cloudy with frequent thunderstorms accompanied by heavy rain everywhere and excessive in many localities. The rain was heaviest in the eastern and western parts of the State. At New Bern over 9 inches fell during the past week.

The average precipitation for the State was over 3 inches above the normal. In some places damage was done by washing and high water, namely in Lincoln, Burke, Chatham, Anson, Randolph, and Scotland counties.

The average temperature was from 2 degrees to 3 degrees below the normal, the coolest weather being on the 12th and 13th. The highest temperature reported was 90 degrees on the 15th in Halifax county, and the lowest 50 degrees on the 13th in Lincoln county.
