SAVE THE LITTLE FISHES!

It takes an actual knowledge and ex perience with the situation in Eastern Carolina to fully appreciate the destruct ion of fish that is going on each year. In the local columns of the Journal a few days ago, was told the story of some twenty tons of edible fish, brought to this market and sold fer a paltry fifty dollars. These same fish, if left to mature, naturally, in a year or two would have sold for fifteen hundred

This is an illustration of the destruc tion of the fish that is taking place. It is the story of how both fish dealer and fisherman, alike, thinking only of today, killing the goose that would always lay the golden egg, and thus depriving themselves of all future gains.

The waters of Eastern North Caro lina offer the finest possibilities for fish revenue of any state on the coast. It is not that the fishermen and dealers of this section are only interested. Every citizen from Piedmont to the western boundaries of the State should take a personal interest in this fish preservation. It is a source of revenue that might prove, and would prove of immense value to the State, if carefully guarded. As it is today, it gives no returns worth mentioning.

In further evidence of the falling away of the fish catch in East Carolina waters, every winter during the best of the fishing season, fishermen from North Carolina go to the Florida coast and from there catch and ship fish to this State. With proper safeguards, the waters of this State would furnish all the fish needed for State consumption, with a big surplus for outside markets.

There have been governors reports and legislative committees appointed, that have sought to remedy the evils. They have done some good, but the real evil is the small fish net. The fisherman with the large mesh net, complains of the fisherman with the next smaller mesh, and so on down, Each seeks a smaller mesh, until today rivers and sounds are filled with fine mesh nets that give the little fish no chance to escape, and tons of fish are secoped up to be thrown on fields, that should have been given the chance to grow to maturity, and become of marketable value. What is demanded is the abolition of every kind of net that has a mesh which serves to scoop up every small fish. If no mesh was smaller than one and one-half inches, it would serve to protect tons of edible fish, that are now caught and serve only for fertilizer. Save the little fishes, that is the legislation needed. For if these are not saved, there will soon be no lit. tle fishes to save, and a great possible industry, a rich sea food product worth hundreds of thousands of dollars, an.

No Man Can Rise From the Class, However Cuctean, In Which Ho Was Born-Neither Wealth for Succeas Affects the Caste of Auy One.

in the fixed scale of descent in India rome classes are merely inferior, while tome are "unclean" or "untouchable," but from whatsoever class a man be born in he has no escape but death. Children born in an "unclean" caste remain "unclean;" children born in ar inferior caste remain as their father were. Nothing that they can do ca in the slightest degree change their situation. They were born "unclean;" their ancestors were "unclean;" their descendants will be "unclean" till the end of the chapter.

To give a few illustrations from many, a weaver is less "unclean" than carpenter, a carpenter is above a house cleaner, a house cleaner is above a street cleaner, and a street cleaner is above a pariah or no caste man. Every trade or occupation has its exact place arbitrarily fixed, in the scale of degra

Above all the men that labor with heir hands in whatsoever way are the tradesmen and shopkeepers, also with subdivisions into classes; above you to promise me not to look at the the tradesmen is the useless and now almost idle warrior class; above the warriors is the Brahman or priestly class, and with these grand divisions the structure of the system is com-

Wealth or material situation or sucess has nothing to do with the caste of any man. You may hire for your cook or valet a Brahman of the purest strain erene, who for weeks before you engaged him may have been on the verge of starvation. The meager beggar to from you toss alms in the road may he of a very high caste. The well fed groom, resplendent in gorgeous livery flashing by on a carriage that covers the beggar with dust, is very likely of a caste a mile below the beggar. Time no more than effort can break down these walls of division. One of the wealthiest and most distinguished fam llies in Calcutta, the famous Tagore family, lost caste about two centuries ago. Members of this family have received honor from the government, have conferred great benefits upon city and country and have been noted for their numerous charities and benefactions. One exerted himself all his life to further native education. Another helped to endow Calcutta university. All are enormously rich, and all bear enviable reputations for goodness, honesty and philanthropy. But the wall of caste has never fallen for them. They are still linted and avoided by their countrymen exactly as they were at the beginning of their exclusion. In the streets of Calcutta is many a ragged artisan that would not sit on the same beuch with a Tagore or touch the end

of his robe. Pain, suffering, penury, even death itself, is nothing to the Hindeo compared with the loss of caste. Many a Hindoo that in the old days would yield nothing to the most fiendish tortures quickly surrendered his secrets when threatened with something that cowskin, perhaps, or a glass of water that had been touched by a parlah. In I suppose, thousands of cases persons that have hopelessly lost their caste have abandoned their homes and wan dered miserably along the roads until death overtook them. Thousands of others have thrown themselves into the

Ganges or deliberately starved. Three Brahman girls who had been degraded by a Mussulman went before g judge to demand vengeance and when the judge declined to interfere killed themselves in the courtroom. At a town called Buj Buj a widow lost caste by falling in love with a man beneath her. As loss of caste by one member of the family degrades the others also, her eldest son imme diately swallowed potson and died, and his remaining brethren fied the
