MISSIONARY WORK IN CAROLINA

Presbyterian Denomination Shows Splendid Development

CHAMBER OF COMMERCE ACTIVE

Seek for Betterment Morally as Well as in Financial and Municipal Matters. Unfortunate Woman's Grief for Her Son Unabated Her Mind.

Special Correspondence. Greensboro, August 1.—For several years there has been much excellent missionary work done by Presbyterian ministers in Ashe and Alleghany counties. Several years ago there was not a Presbyterian church in these counties. Now there are several resident ministers, flourishing congregations and attractive church edifices. This week there are several meetings going on in different parts of Ashe county alone, and three Presbyterian ministers from here, Revs. Melton Clarke, B. M. Rankin and B. Murphy Williams left this morning for Ashe to assist in conducting them. Rev. Mr. Rankin, who is the evangelist for the Orange Presbytery returned last night from Rockingham county, where as the result of a meeting held at Bayman last week he organized a church on Sunday with 38 members.

Rev. J. R. Moore and his family, who have been on a vacation from missionary work in Korea for the past year, left this morning for San Francisco, whence they will sail August 8th, for Yokohama, Japan. He will be one month making the voyage to his destination at Seoul, Korea.

He will be absent this time seven years. Mr. Moore since returning to America a year ago for a "vacation" has been a very busy man, his services being in demand all over the country, as far away as Texas.

Atlantic Hotel, Morehead City, Aug. 1.—Mr. W. L. Kennedy, of Falling Creek, went out fishing alone today and caught with hook and line 146 Mackerel, 183 Trout, 75 Croakers and 3 blue fish weighing 500 pounds. This was among the largest catch this season, but is not unusual for fishermen like Mr. Kennedy. The fishing is elegant and the weather fine.

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GLENN'S PRESIDENTIAL BOOM

Banded About To Overcome His Aspirations For Senatorship

WHAT RAILWAYS PAY THE STATE

Louisville & Nashville Claims Loss on Its 13 Miles of Road Within the State. Railroads Must Carry Passengers. Death of William E. Capeheart of Avoca. Aldermen Will Vote Soon on \$100,000 Bond Issue.

Special Correspondence. Raleigh, Aug. 1.—It is a current remark by a number of cotton growers that the crop this season is the prospect in many years. Today it was said that the long dry spell is at last beginning to have its effect on cotton and to cause shedding, at the time when the plant needs all the strength it can possibly get and when loss of any fruit costs fatally.

Some of the newspapers are booming Governor Glenn for the presidency and going through the motions at least. Some newspapers remarked that the governor was being shelved, this of course read between the lines, meaning that the boom was to turn him aside from the senatorship, for which position a number of persons have declared he is or will be an aspirant. Your correspondent sometime ago stated, after an interview with the governor, even with his closest friends or his family, that he is a candidate for the senatorship. Today he reiterated this declaration, saying he had never announced he was a candidate for any office. He went on to say that he doubted whether friends of his were booming him for the presidency. He smiled as he said that he appreciated the "courtesy" shown him by mentioning his name in connection with this great position, but thought it entirely premature for any southern man whatever to be even talked about for the presidency.

He said very frankly that if a southern man was to be the nominee, there were others bigger and better than himself. The governor has borne himself very handsomely through all this matter, by the way, and he does not fail to divide with Judge Long, his council of state, his attorneys, the Wake county grand jury, etc., the honors which have lately fallen so thick in North Carolina.

Of course there is all sorts of talk about the railways for and against, but they are yet important factors in the state's development and also as to revenue. For example the Southern railway will this year pay a thousand dollars a day in state, county, and municipal taxes. Last year it paid 774 dollars a day. This calculation includes Sundays as well as week days. The governor says that the Carolina & Northwestern railway will put on the two and a quarter cent passenger rate August 8th.

The Louisville & Nashville railway in its report to the Corporation Commission says that on its 13 miles of line in North Carolina, all in Cherokee county, it lost last year \$1,300, but it is found that it does not include the freight it receives from other lines, notably the Southern railway, but only includes what originates within the 13 miles. This road connects with the Southern at Murphy and has a heavy traffic.

It is now supposed that all the railways will be represented at the hearing which the governor is calling for, or rather inviting them to the office of the Corporation Commission, Aug. 5th, this hearing to be on the specific subject of freight rates. So far only two of the big roads have announced their intention of being on hand at this very important meeting.

It was stated in some newspaper this week that one road in the state, which by the way is over 90 miles long, would take on all its passenger trains at an early date. It may be stated that if such a course were taken the road would be very speedily required to put the trains on tracks, as under the law such common carriers are required to furnish proper passenger facilities.

More news is expressed here at the death of Mr. William H. Capeheart of Avoca. He was for a number of years a member of the state board of agriculture. His great hobby and one which he pursued with more than a hobby was that of the horse. In the winter of 1898 he was the owner of the famous "Horse of the Year" which he had trained and which he had won the "Horse of the Year" title.
