DEAF AND DUMB MAN KILLED

John Daniels, Farmer of No. 2 Township Has Down by Train.

Mr. John Daniels, a well known farmer of No. 2 Township, was struck by a train on the Raleigh and Pamlico Sound division of the Norfolk and Southern road and killed. Mr. Daniels, it is said, had been walking on the track, and being deaf and not hearing the warning whistle, was struck. The body was frightfully mutilated, the arms, legs and neck were broken, and there were several contusions on the head and body. He had been growing dumb in consequence of his deafness.

Another white man, named Ed Filby, was injured by a train on the Pamlico Oriental and Western road. He was brought to New Bern and taken to the Stewart Sanatorium. An examination showed that his injuries were not serious; severe bruises being about the extent. It is said he fell off the train.
