MUCH CALMER FELLING IN WALL STREET

Short Run On Lincoln Trust Co. More Confidence But Money is Tied Up. Special to Journal.
New York, Oct. 28.—While the feeling in all circles is much calmer than that which prevailed on last Friday and Saturday, yet there continues some unrest. This uneasiness was shown towards the Lincoln Trust Company, depositors waiting outside most of Sunday night, until the opening this morning. The run on this company was short and is probably at an end. More normal conditions exist in other quarters. Clearing House certificates and certified checks are being used as currency. Gold shipments are reported coming from England. The savings banks are holding back, forcing the thirty and sixty day notes to be given. It is estimated \$1,000,000,000 is thus tied up.

PRESIDENT'S PROCLAMATION FOR THANKSGIVING DAY

Our Condition is Fortunate. Peace at Home and Abroad Give Cause For Gratitude.
Washington, D. C., October 28.—President Roosevelt has issued his Thanksgiving proclamation, through the Secretary of State, naming the last Thursday in November, the 29th. The proclamation follows:

"Once again the season of the year has come, when in accordance with the custom of our forefathers for generations past, the President appoints a day as the special occasion for all our people to give praise and thanksgiving to God.
"During the past year we have been free from famine, from pestilence, from war. We are at peace with all the rest of mankind. Our natural resources are at least as great as those of any other nation. We believe that in ability to develop and take advantage of the resources the average man of this nation stands at least as high as the average man of any other. Nowhere else in the world is there such an opportunity for a free people to develop to the fullest extent all its powers of body, of mind, and that which stands above both body and mind—character.

"Much has been given us from on high, and much will rightly be expected of us in return. Into our care the ten talents have been entrusted; and we are to be pardoned neither if we squander and waste them, nor yet if we hide them in a napkin; for they must be fruitful in our hands. Ever throughout the ages, at all times, and among all people, prosperity has been fraught with danger, and it behoves us to beseech the giver of all things and of luxury, that we may not lose our sense of moral responsibility; that we may not forget our duty to God and to our neighbor.

"A great democracy like ours, a democracy based upon the principles of orderly liberty, can be perpetuated only if in the heart of the ordinary citizen there dwells a keen sense of righteousness and justice. We should earnestly pray that this spirit of righteousness and justice may grow ever greater in the hearts of all of us evermore both toward the virtues that call for gentleness and tenderness, for loving kindness and forbearance one with another, and toward mankind—without these qualities neither nation or individual can rise to the level of greatness.

"Now, therefore, I, Theodore Roosevelt, President of the United States, do set apart Thursday, November 28, as a day of general thanksgiving and prayer."

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NATIONAL RIVERS AND HARBORS CONGRESS

Important Meeting in Washington D. C. to Consider the Perfection of Water Ways.

The National Rivers and Harbors Congress meets for annual session in Washington, D. C., December 4, 5, and 6. The purposes of this meeting are obvious and it is to be sincerely desired that a delegation of representative business men from this section will attend the meeting. Eastern Carolina is peculiarly in need of better waterways and action taken this way will produce results quicker than any other. It most needs men who are awake to the situation who will go to the meeting and make themselves a factor there. There is perhaps no section of the country more entitled to recognition than is eastern Carolina, nor is any more in need of improved water ways.
