ACTION CAUSES ANGRY COMMENT

DEPUTY UNITED STATES MARSHAL GETS SOME VALUABLE POINTERS IN REGARD TO JUVENILE CRIMINALS

NO WHISKEY PRESCRIPTIONS

High School Exercises Suspended—Excursion to Wake Forest—The Non Action of Virginia Corporation Commission Causes Surprise—Yegmen Safely Housed

Raleigh, N. C., Feb. 14.—One of the amusing things at the recent meeting of the Young Men's Republican Club, here, was that a resolution was introduced to endorse Taft for the presidency, but it seems that it was not acted upon and motion to adjourn very quickly followed. Some of the members of the club expected that it would create a great stir among the Democrats. The principal effect of it so far as can be heard is that it made the negroes very angry. They are now talking about forming a colored Republican Club, but some of them say that they do not care about having anything to do with the Republicans anyway, that is with the white branch of the party, which they claim has ignored them. The negroes have learned that they cut no ice; so to speak, with the white Republicans—certainly the office holders. Very little pie goes their way. Some white Republicans have been heard to say that the negro has passed out of North Carolina politics for all time to come.

United States Deputy Marshal Mitchell, has returned from the United States Reformatory near Washington where he took a couple of youths who were sent there for a year each by Judge Boyd at the recent term of court here. The Superintendent of the Reformatory told Deputy Mitchell that the judges do not send kids for terms sufficiently long to be of value to them and that the western judges send them for say five years, and during that time they are taught valuable trades, educated and a great deal more is done with them than can possibly be done during the short term for which the judges in the south send them. This is a matter which ought to be looked into and Marshal Claude Dockery spoke of it specially.

The Wake Co. and Raleigh doctors will not give any whiskey prescriptions to druggists except for purely medical purposes. This action is unanimous.

Upon the arrival of the notorious and daring Yegmen, five in number, who robbed the Dunn postoffice, the county prisoners in the jail here, have been put into a different section, leaving the United States prisoners in a separate cell block. United States Marshal Dockery has "put a tight watch" to guard this particular group of prisoners, all dangerous and daring men and it is not proposed to permit them to escape from this jail. No doubt they have confederates outside who will come here and if possible aid them in getting away, these men being up to all the tricks of such desperadoes.

The exercises at the Cary High School were suspended this afternoon on account of the death of the wife of Mayor Jordan at that town. The High School now has 300 students. It has the honor of being the first one formed in the State in the new class known as rural High Schools.

A number of Raleigh people went out to Wake Forest this evening on special train to be present at the anniversary of the two literary societies and to hear the debate between them. The orchestra of the Third Regiment band furnished the music. Among the visitors were many students of the Baptist University for Women.

Some trouble is expressed in certain circles that the Virginia Corporation Commission did not raise the rate of railway passenger fare to 2 1/2 cents. The commission here has full power to do this sort of thing under the new constitution of the State. It has been said to your correspondent by various persons, a number of weeks ago, that as proper time has passed, it would be the duty of the State to reform through the State. It was a 2 1/2 cent rate that was raised by the commission and the case has gone to the United States Supreme court, having been docketed there.

THREE PRISONERS ESCAPE FROM JAIL

Negroes Bore Hole Through 14 Inch Wall With a Hoe—A Hoard Offered

Boring their way through a 14-inch brick wall in the dead hours of the night, three prisoners made their escape from the county jail last night. The implement used was a peculiarly shaped hoe, the top being in the shape of a two-pronged rake. The hoe was without handle, and steady work was necessarily necessary for the boring of the hole, which was large enough to admit the passage of a man of medium size.

The scene of the jail breakers' operations was the rear end of the jail. They were all in for petty offenses, and were confined in the corridor. They had easy access to their work, not being hindered, as are the other prisoners in the jail, by cell bars.

The hoe is supposed to have been smuggled into the corridor by a city street prisoner. These short time men are locked into the corridor each very quickly, and one could easily have concealed the implement under his coat.

The work of boring was all done after bedtime last night. Yesterday the grand jury and the sheriff both inspected the building, beside the regular inspection of the inside by the jailors.

The hole made by the men was about eight feet from the ground on the exterior, and about four feet from the floor on the interior.

The escaped men are: Tom Ward, larceny. Eli Chapman, larceny. Will Brown, larceny.

All of them are young men, Ward being about 21, Chapman's age is unknown and Brown is about 18.

They were undergoing trial at the Superior Court now in session. Ward for stealing a pair of shoes, Chapman a quantity of junk brass, and Brown a pair of boots.

The county officers are working on the location of the fugitives, but as yet their efforts have not been successful.

Sheriff Riels has offered a reward of \$20 for each of the men.

WIPES OUT FUTURE TRADING

Mississippi Legislature Passes Boddie Bill and Governor Will Sign It

Jackson, Miss., Feb. 14.—What is known as the "Boddie bill" passed the Senate today by unanimous vote, and having previously passed the House the same way, goes to the governor, who will sign it.

This bill wipes out of existence every bucket shop and exchange where deals in futures are made. There can be no manner of speculation in futures on any commodity "take State" under this bill, and every bucket shop in the State will have to close by the first of June or the managers, clerks and agents will be liable to jail sentences and heavy fines.

ANTHRACITE CENTENARY ENDS

Ranked by Wilkes-Barre Board of Trade

Wilkes-Barre, Feb. 14.—With the banquet of the board of trade of this city tonight ended the two-day celebration of the centennial of the first burning of anthracite in a grate by Judge Fell of this city. Tonight's gathering was composed of the foremost men in the region. William J. Baker, president of the board, was chairman of ceremonies, and Fred C. Kirkendall, mayor of this city, the toast master. Mr. J. Benjamin Dimmock, mayor of Scranton, spoke up on the duties of citizenship and urged every man to strive to do more for the benefit of the community in which he lives.

C. J. Lucas, a prominent lawyer of Williamsport, in an address on the need of public spirit in a city's growth, opposed municipal ownership and strongly upheld the rights of corporations.

The Rev. Edward Gier, pastor of the First Church, described the life of a man he thought a greater Wilkes-Barre should be and Dudley W. Lewis of Scranton, an health secretary, spoke for cities.

INTEREST CENTRES IN STATE MUSEUM

Historical and Curious Specimens are Being Gathered From all Parts of The State

Raleigh, N. C., Feb. 14.—The room in which fish are shown in the State Museum is being very greatly enriched by numerous new specimens and there will be several cabinets containing live fish of various kinds, all fresh water varieties.

A very amusing thing occurred in the State Museum yesterday. While a case was being placed there in which were some glass imitations of gems intended to show the various forms of cuttings of precious stones, the case was left unlocked, the things being of no value and along came some light-fingered person and stole about a dozen pieces of glass, evidently thinking they were great treasures. As a matter of fact they cost about 50 cents a gross, and the theft caused quite a laugh.

Today the collection of fire arms in the museum, with the exception of a very few special specimens was arranged in two groups in a very beautiful and large case, and makes the finest show ever seen in this State.

On one side are shown all the arms from the period of the crusades to the close of the Civil war, on the other side being shown those in use since the Civil war period. The contrast is very striking indeed. Guns, pistols, swords, daggers, etc. are shown. The interest shown by men and boys in the collection of arms is very pronounced. Four boys out of five like this department better than any other as inquiries have shown.
