### EX GOV. AYCOCK ON PROHIBITION

#### HE THINKS THE MEASURE WILL CARRY—FOOL INDICATES MAJORITY OF 5000 FOR PROHIBITION

Lots of Our Talking by the "Partisan" Good Progress on History of N. Carolina—Aristocratic Stockholders Made a Nice Speech—Building Will Not be Erected at Present—Sales of Leaf Tobacco—News From Raleigh

Raleigh, N. C., March 10.—The Governor Aycock, who was here today, was asked the question of what he thought of the election upon prohibition and replied that North Carolina would go for prohibition by a good majority. Your correspondent finds that conservative estimates are a majority from 30,000 to 30,000. Some persons named 75,000, but this seems to be very fancy guessing. There is some concern expressed as to damage to fruits, etc., by the warm weather. Last year more damage was done than in a number of seasons past.

The town marshal of Cary, Pump Jones, was here today and said that not in years had he seen so many hoboes as are now on the train. ### TWO HOUSES BURNED

A house on Smith street, owned by Isaac H. The fire originated in the house occupied by Mattie Johnson and was caused by a defective fuse. Nobody was at home and most of the household goods were destroyed. There was small insurance on the houses, and none on the goods. The loss on the houses was between \$3000 and \$7500.

It is the Journal's sad duty to again mention the bad condition of the fire alarm. Yesterday the ring rang out twice then once, signifying box 21. There is no box 21, and naturally the drivers headed for South Front street thinking that the fire might be located near Middle street and the alarm box stationed there being the next number. When the drivers found their mistake they turned back to the engine house and waited until one of the firemen who had seen the smoke, arrived and told where it was. Then the two horses sped out together making one of the prettiest races that has been seen here for a long time. The new horses proved themselves equal to the occasion and won high praise. But there was time lost in the starting which a well regulated fire alarm system could have avoided. It is a menace to property to have such a thing doing public service. There have been warnings several times in this time; there will be something more than a warning and the city will awake to find that the fire alarm system is to blame.

Why not have the alarm system put right before anything disastrous to property occurs. This is simply a question suggested by the fire yesterday. The criticism is made merely for the sake of having the thing corrected and saving the city law suits.
