Washington, D. C., Jan. 12 - Drastic action looking toward the suppression of the "white slave" in the United States was taken to-day by the House. A bill passed under which, if adopted by the Senate, it will be unlawful for any person to provide transportation from one State to another for any person who engated in prostitution or other immoral practices. The mere purchase of a ticket for a woman where she would be "enabled or assisted" to go from State to State for immoral purposes will render the purchaser hable to ten years imprisenment and a \$5 000 fine. Immorial alien women are to be deported whenever they are discovered and their procurers are to te excluded, deported and punished.

"It is intended that this measure shall be drastic." declared Representative Bennet, of New York, in charge of the measure, and co-author of it. "This infamous 'white slave' traffic must be broken up and the immigration committee believes the pending measure will survive every constitutional test to which it may be subject-


