PATTEN HOOTED FROM EXCHANGE

Famous Stock Manipulator Grosse Insulted in English Pit.

Manchester, Eng., March 12.—James Patten, the Chicago wheat and cotton manipulator, was hooted out of the Manchester Cotton Exchange today.

Mr. Patten was recognized a few minutes after he entered the exchange and was immediately surrounded by a hooting crowd. Brokers came to the big manipulator's aid and escorted him to the street, where the hostile demonstration was renewed with such vigor that a strong force of police was called.

"We don't want bread-stalers or cotton thieves here!" shouted members of the mob as they shook their fists in his face. For a while it looked as if the crowd would do bodily harm to Patten and he became pale and excited.

The police had difficulty in driving the crowd back from the building in which Patten took refuge. They formed a guard about him and got him safely into a cab, which was driven at break-neck speed to his hotel.

Mr. Patten's market operations are believed to be inimical to the big cotton spinning interests of this city. The Chicagoan's nerves were plainly shaken when he regained the hotel.

Cotton experts who talked with Mr. Patten are convinced today that he has come to England to investigate the consumption of raw material, so he may be guided more clearly in his future operations in cotton.

Mr. Patten insists that there is no "business" connected with his trip, but the moment he arrived here today from Liverpool he began interviewing some of the big cotton spinners, and then visited the cotton exchange. The cotton spinners with whom he talked say his conversation clearly indicated that he is here for "pointers."

Mr. Patten has done little since his arrival to England except to mix with those interested in the cotton industry. If pleasure has anything to do with his trip he has not disclosed it.

COURT OF APPEALS AFFIRMS WADDILL

Refuses to Allow Intervention in Sale of Norfolk and Southern Railway.

Richmond Times Dispatch—March 12. The United States Circuit Court of Appeals yesterday affirmed the opinion of Judge Edmund Waddill, Jr., of the United States Circuit Court, denying Zell and others the right to intervene in the sale of the Norfolk and Southern Railway properties. Zell and others claimed the right of control by virtue of an agreement with the members of the re-organization committee, to which the road was sold at public auction. In sustaining Judge Waddill, the appellate court confirms the sale, and ends all litigation, unless the case is taken to the Supreme Court. The title of the case as decided yesterday is Frank D. Zell et al., appellants versus the Norfolk and Southern Railway et al., appellees, appealed from the Circuit Court at Norfolk.

POLICE CLASH WITH STRIKERS

Strike Leaders Had Planned A Great Demonstration at Philadelphia Base Ball Park.

Philadelphia, March 12.—Ridden down by the police, who clubbed men and women alike, a parade of more than 15,000 striking men was dispersed this afternoon on its way down Broad street to the city hall from the Philadelphia Ball Park. More than a score, including five newspaper reporters, were arrested. Among the injured was J. Burwood Daly, attorney for the Carman's Union.

The parade started when the workmen found the gates of the ball park where they had expected to hold a mass meeting, locked, and guarded by police. Converging at the ball park from several parts of the city, the workers reached the big grounds at noon. They had been instructed by their leaders to go there for a meeting which the police had prohibited. It was to have been addressed by C. O. Pratt and other leaders.

The marching strikers were awaited by a small army of policemen, including a detail of mounted men, at Fifteenth and Cumberland streets. After marching around the ball park the crowd swept the police aside and marched down to Brandywine street. There the police made a stand, clubbing right and left, turning the crowd down Brandywine street to Thirteenth, where more policemen awaited it.

Five newspaper reporters who came down Broad street in an automobile ahead of the crowd were arrested, charged with inciting to riot. They have been traveling with Pratt ever since the strike began. The Assistant Chief of Police took away their police cards and detained them in a room in the City Hall later, after a hearing before a magistrate, they were held in \$1,000 bail each for a further hearing next week. Bail was furnished by the newspapers employing them.

"The demonstration this afternoon and the tyranny shown will crystallize the sentiment of the public in favor of a State-wide strike," Pratt said.

Asked if he believed there would be such a strike, he said: "That will be our last resort. We are not in favor of strikes at any time, but I am afraid sentiment is so strong that the public will demand it."

Hundreds of working girls and men paid ten cents each to ride to work by the "wagon route" early this morning, but they were ordered out by the police. The drivers of twenty-five wagons were arrested for carrying passengers without a license.

DISAPPEARING FOREIGN TRADE

As Compared With One year Ago In Foodstuffs.

Washington, March 12.—The report of the Department of Commerce and Labor on the exports of foodstuffs from the United States for February, 1910, shows a general falling off as compared with February a year ago. Wheat exports last month were 1,000,109 bushels, as against 2,444,960 bushels in February 1909; corn exports last month were 4,547,045 as against 5,310,019 bushels in the corresponding month a year ago, wheat flour exports in February were 523,311 barrels, as against 724,350 barrels a year ago.

Exports of meal and dairy products last February were valued at \$9,696,482, compared with \$11,634,382 in February, 1909.

Exports of cotton last month were 168,945,900 pounds as against 265,690,618 pounds in the corresponding month of the previous year.

Export of cattle, hogs and sheep last month showed an increase over exports in February last year, amounting to \$1,386,977 in February, 1910, and \$1,211,472 in February 1909.

Mineral oil exports increased last month over February, 1909, the comparative figures being 99,212,097 gallons last month and 83,818,908 in February, 1909.
